### DEVELOPMENT

When looking back over the 1973 season at first thought it would appear to have been a quiet season development wise and it probably was. However, a lot of activity occurs even in quiet seasons.

On the debit side we lost Central Waikato Association, although administration of their area has been taken over by Hamilton and we were unable to resolve a dispute in Waimate so that players in this township are at present not affiliated. Counterbalancing these losses are a very promising development operation in the Otago area by the Franklin Association which should bear dividends for the sport and the formation of the Central North Island Association. Secondary school and junior coaching activities continue to expand in many Associations.

During the year the first two "live in" schools were held at Lower Hutt and Dunedin respectively and these schools for junior players who did not gain selection for the National Junior Coaching Schools were a considerable success.

The South Canterbury Sports Stadium complex is nearing completion and fundraising at the time of writing has brought the organisers within \$45,000 of the total price for the building. Also at the time of writing a coaching booklet for use by school teachers is almost completed and this booklet should be printed during 1974 and will be distributed throughout New Zealand schools by the Education Department.

The New Zealand Executive made the decision this year to join the New Zealand Federation of Sport and while no direct benefit has ensued it is felt that membership of this body will be a help to us in the future.

Publicity this year has received a boost due to Bob Lassen's able efforts in producing the Auckland Table Tennis Magazine, which is eagerly read by many enthusiasts throughout New Zealand and the reappearance, after a lapse of time, of articles in the New Zealand Sports Digest now written by Alan Tomlinson and our thanks go to these two people for their enthusiasm.

### THE FUTURE

Specific problems affecting future development are lack of communication and lack of people with time available to concentrate on development work. The Development Sub-committee of the New Zealand Association is very keen on this proposal has led to a remit being sponsored by the Northern Associations proposing a National Development Council. Also to be tabled is the 10 year development plan which should be the subject of major fruitful discussion.

We are all hopeful that consideration of these proposals at this year's Annual Meeting will lead us to a progressive policy for the future.

### CHAMPIONSHIPS

**Inter-association Teams Championships:** There were 28 teams in the men's section and 22 in the women's section and the entry included teams from Fiji, New Caledonia and Tahiti. The New Caledonia party arrived with only one woman player and it was agreed at the team captains and managers meeting that a composite side consisting of a player from New Caledonia, Bay of Plenty and Manawatu, be permitted to play but that the results be not counted in the competition. It was also agreed that the Tahiti and New Caledonia teams should not compete in the promotion and relegation contest should they win their grade but that the matter be discussed at the New Zealand Annual General Meeting for a decision regarding future competitions. Both New Caledonia and Tahiti men's team won all their matches in the "D" grade section competition and likewise the Tahiti women won all their contests in their grade.

The competition saw a move by the "A" grade teams to end the contest when a result had been obtained and figures showed that 19 of the 30 contests were ended as soon as the team had won six matches and of the remaining 11 contests, three were either called off as soon as a win had been achieved or played out and eight had to be played out to obtain a decision. In the other grades the majority of contests were played out although there were one or two contests ended when a decision had been reached.

Canterbury men swept all before them to retain the "A" grade title and their points of 32 matches for and seven against gives a true picture of their supremacy. Franklin men were clear winners of the "B" grade and continued their success by beating Hutt Valley in the promotion/relegation contest and thus gained "A" grade status for 1974. Manawatu men had a similar success in the "C" grade and later beating Nelson for a position in the "B" grade next year. Bay of Plenty men also added to their success of winning the "D" grade by beating Marlborough for a position in the "C" grade next year.

In the woman's section Auckland held on to win the "A" grade on a count back of games from Hamilton and Nelson displaced Northland in the promotion/relegation contest. Manawatu scored a double success for the Association by winning "B" grade status next year with a good win over South Taranaki. North Shore withstood a challenge from Rotorua to retain its "C" grade position.

We are grateful to the Bay of Plenty Association for the donation of a shield for the women's "D" grade competition thus completing a shield trophy for all grades.

### INTER-ASSOCIATION TEAMS CHAMPIONSHIPS

**Notes.** With New Caledonia and Tahiti included in the teams events, there were 28 men's teams and 22 women's teams. New Caledonia's women's team was a composit (New Caledonia/Bay of Plenty/Manawatu) as only one New Caledonia woman player arrived.

At the request of East Waikato and approved by Bay of Plenty Association and members of the N.Z. Executive, it was agreed to place East Waikato in "D" Grade and Waitemata in "C" (women) (East Waikato finished bottom of "D" Grade and Waitemata third in "C" Grade).

## VICTOR BARNA DUNLOP CUP AWARDS

The Award Committee submitted the following report:

### Personnel:

The judging committee consisted of Mr Allan McBride, (Convener), Mesdames Olive Hughes and Noeline Benjamin. Each member was on the job all the time until the completion of the Tuesday afternoon session when our final deliberations were concluded.

### CRITERIA:

We followed the amended list of "points deductable for each offence, 1973" (as circulated by L. E. Bouzaid) rigidly for our individual judging and for the purpose of declaring the winners. However, when we had the time to consider in retrospect the relative seriousness of many of the offences we did take the liberty of altering many of the points for the final summary. For example each judge at every session deducted points because the colours on the trimmings of the modern-day sandshoes did not match. This was a minor matter that affected most teams and added up to a lot of points—well out of proportion to what was intended by the donors of the award. We are confident that the order of placings and the final Penalty Points deducted present a very true picture of the general attitude and appearance of the teams which took part.

### TEAMS ATTITUDE:

In addition to our adjudicating we took the opportunity to discuss the pros and cons of the Barna Cup Award with a cross section of team managers and team captains. Our conclusions were that in general the teams in the "A" Section were not interested and adopted a "couldn't care less" attitude. Their attitude was that they came to win and the Barna Cup rules hindered rather than assisted them towards this goal. This of course is very unfortunate because many of our leading players—particularly the younger ones—are setting a poor example for others.

In the other three sections the majority of teams adopted a very responsible and sensible attitude towards the award and this was reflected in the very high standard of behaviour, dress and sportsmanship overall. This was particularly so in the women's section where four teams came through with 100 percent perfection—a remarkable effort considering the very severe scrutiny they were subjected to in the last two sessions. East Waikato was declared the winner only because its players made an extra special effort and changed into clean socks and cleaned their shoes between each session.

### History of the Competition

During his tour of New Zealand in 1949, accompanied by Richard Bergmann, Victor Barna offered a trophy for the promotion of "inter-town competition" on a knock-out basis, or such other promotion of the sport as the New Zealand Executive Committee thought fit.

The trophy was received in 1950 through the courtesy of Dunlop Sports (N.Z.) Ltd., who requested that the trophy be known as the "Victor Barna Dunlop Cup."

The New Zealand Executive Committee decided that the cup shall be awarded annually to the Association whose team or teams, competing in the Inter-Association Teams Championships, excel in play, in sportsmanship, appearance, team spirit and punctuality. At first it was decided that the award shall be won by an Association and not by any one team of that Association, in the belief that the award would be an incentive to all Associations to maintain better discipline and foster stronger team spirit among all its players. However, difficulty arose when some Associations had only one team competing, while others had two, and after the first two years of competition, the rules were amended to provide for each team to be considered on its own merits. In 1965, the rules were further amended to provide for two separate competitions, one for men's teams and one for women's teams and again through the courtesy of Dunlop Sports (N.Z.) Ltd. a second identical cup was presented.

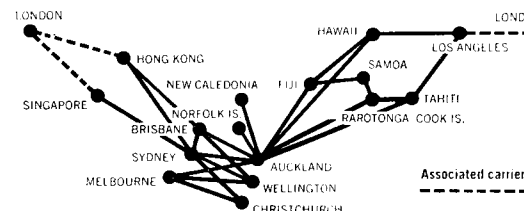

## NEW ZEALAND CHAMPIONSHIPS

Although 203 entries were received for the men's singles event, the first time that the 200 figure has been reached, through withdrawals only 182 players competed for the title. The entries, however, for the junior and veteran events were maintained and were higher than any previously received. The overall entry of 994 entries was a record. The entry of 25 overseas players—ten from Fiji, nine from New Caledonia and six from French Polynesia (Tahiti) again added international flavour to the championships.

It was pleasing to note that six juniors were in the last 16 of the large field for the men's singles event and although Kerry Palmer (Auckland) was the only one to reach the last eight, it augurs well for the sport when so many youngsters can survive for so long.

The winners of the men's and women's singles titles, R. E. Lee (Wellington) and Miss A. D. Stonestreet (Auckland) repeated their success of 1971 and again signalled a triumph for youth for both are 19 years old. Ann Stonestreet's success was her third in a row and in the final against Neti Traill (Northland) eight-times New Zealand champion, she won convincingly 21-15, 21-11, 21-11. Miss Stonestreet continued her success with a treble for the second year in succession winning the women's doubles with Miss K. A. Fraser (Auckland) and the mixed doubles with her coach, G. J. Jennings (Auckland).

A comprehensive report on the tournament submitted by Mr A. R. Harding was circulated to all Associations. Summarising the tournament, Mr Harding wrote, "All in all it was a very successful week due largely to excellent planning and to a team of efficient, experienced administrators, whose courtesy and understanding was appreciated by all and I am sure their manner and patience, despite the stress and strain of the tournament, gained them many admirers. This was a tournament which was much appreciated and which would result in most players leaving Tauranga with fond memories and a wish to return."

## NEW ZEALAND MAORI CHAMPIONSHIPS

Ross Davison, 17-year old Auckland clerk, collected six titles at the eight New Zealand Maori and Island Territories Championships held at Turangi on Saturday and Sunday, 22 and 23 September. The finals were a triumph for youth with 17-year-old Gloria Laison from Tauranga winning the women's singles and joining Davison for two mixed doubles titles, the open and under-18 events.

Although originally granted to the Auckland Association under the control of a Maori Committee, the venue was later changed to Turangi as a means of development for the areas of Taupo, Turangi and Taumarunui. Entries were not as high as some previous years but a good even standard was maintained throughout. The tournament was opened by Mr K. T. Wetere, Member of Parliament for Western Maori. Mr Wetere said that table tennis was a sport in which Maoris should excel as it provided the type of challenge the Maori enjoyed.

Mr L. E. Bouzaid was co-ordinating officer for the championships and he was responsible for the excellent pre-publicity material, for the publication of a tournament booklet and for the invitation to Maori Members of Parliament and other Maori Elders. The tournament manager was Mr E. R. Clarke of Taumarunui and he was assisted by Mr I. L. Houghton (Wellington) and Mr K. L. Pointon, President New Zealand Umpires Association.

**Fiji Team Tour:** A team of players from Fiji visited Auckland prior to participation at the New Zealand National Week in Tauranga. The following extract from the Auckland Association's magazine gives the details—

"A team of players from Fiji commenced a 'build-up' tour in Auckland prior to their participation in the N.Z. Championships. This included two major tournaments, the North Shore Open and the Auckland Open. Albert Traill and Francis Singh took games off James Morris and Alan Thomlinson respectively in the early rounds of the Auckland Open.

"Matches against local club sides were also arranged. Ellerslie, Jordon and St Oswalds put up only token resistance which must have been disappointing for the visitors who were trying to get hard intensive play in preparation for the nationals. Later matches against Pt Chevalier and Pakuranga provided stronger opposition.

"In the Pakuranga contest Fiji lost 11—19; against Jordon the Fijians won 19—8 and against Pt Chevalier Fiji lost 12—20.

"An Auckland schoolboy side played the Fiji players on a Friday morning at the Auckland Stadium. Fiji won comfortably although the young Aucklanders Rex Haultain won all four singles, defeating the Suva champion Albert Traill.

"An afternoon was spent at the Wilsons sports factory and the visitors climax the tour with a week at Tauranga before returning home."

**Tahiti and New Caledonia:** A regular pattern appears to be developing for exchange of visits of clubs and teams between the Auckland Association and Tahiti and New Caledonia. The Auckland Association's annual report mentions the visit of an Auckland team consisting of Alan Tomlinson (Manager), Kerry Palmer, Ross Davison and Kathie Fraser to Tahiti at the invitation of the Lique Polynesienne de Tennis de Table. The Auckland team beat Tahiti in two major contests 8—3 and 9—2 respectively. In a specially organised tournament Kerry Palmer and Kathie Fraser won the men's and women's singles events respectively.

A team from the Olympique Club (New Caledonia) visited Auckland in March. The report adds, "The inter-change of visits between teams from Auckland with those from Tahiti, Noumea and Fiji is a tremendous achievement and such tours appear to now be on a regular basis".

## NATIONAL JUNIOR TEAMS TOURNAMENT

The National Junior Teams Tournament for boys and girls are aimed at improving the standard of table tennis by providing match play for juniors, thus giving them incentive and encouragement to improve their play and earn selection as representatives of their associations. After playing under a zone system, which is allocated simply on geographical grounds, the surviving teams meet in a round robin series of contests played at the central venue on the first Saturday in August.

Northland failed to field a boys' or girls' team and a girls' team was not forthcoming from Rotorua, Northern Hawkes Bay and Wairarapa. This reflects on development particularly in the schools of these areas and the Associations concerned need to seriously consider ways and means of building up their junior ranks.

Canterbury again proved too strong in the boys' section winning all their contests comfortably. The girls' section was a triumph for Franklin whose matches against the other competing teams were all exciting with the result in doubt until the last game was played.

The Tournament Manager, Mr R. J. Menchi, submitted the following report on the finals played at the Empire Table Tennis Club rooms, Petone, on Saturday 4 August, 1973.

The finals for 1973 differed from those of previous years in that the winners were determined by a round robin tournament among the semi-finalists. This was the result of a decision reached at the last N.Z.A.G.M. Only one dissenting opinion was advanced against this form of tournament on the grounds that the fixture would prove too strenuous. But I found the players enthusiastic and the fact that they were keen to attend a post-tournament function indicated their reserves of stamina had not been exhausted.

This tournament of 1973 was quite the best I have experienced.

The girls' competition was wonderful with the morning and afternoon contests reaching five all and the deciding matches proved very tense and exciting. The evening contest did not quite reach the same heights of tension, but nevertheless this year's competition must surely have been an enjoyable one for the girls.

The boys' section was not as interesting because of the great strength of the Canterbury team.

I must pay a tribute to the H.V.T.T.A. Secretary, Mrs L. Bargh, and no praise can be too high for the manner in which she provided transport, the excellent work in assisting and arranging of billets and for the provision of afternoon tea and supper.

All the teams were to have arrived on Friday night but a dispensation was granted to Canterbury as some of their players were playing against the Japanese on Friday night. Consequently their arrival Saturday morning prevented an early start and the sessions all day were over a half hour late. I would like to see the first session begin at 9 a.m., the afternoon session at 2 p.m., evening 7.30 p.m.

### ROTHMANS BEST CLUB TEAM TOURNAMENT

A tournament to find the best club team in New Zealand was introduced this year with the assistance of Rothmans sponsorship. The winning team received \$100 and the Rothmans Challenge Shield. The tournament was a revival of a similar tournament held in 1946 which was won by the Empire Club (Hutt Valley) beating YMCA (Otago) in the final 14—12.

Associations were drawn to play in groups selected on geographical boundaries and the tournament was conducted on an elimination group system to find the teams to compete in the finals. Entries were received from Auckland (Jordon Club), Bush (Kaitawa), Canterbury (University), Franklin (Manurewa), Hamilton (Hillcrest), Hutt Valley (Empire), North Shore (Coasters), Wanganui (Durie Hill), Wellington (Kilbirnie RSA) and East Waikato. The group winners were Jordon, Hillcrest, Kilbirnie RSA and University.

On the same day as the finals were scheduled at Wellington the finals of the National Junior Teams Tournament were also held in Wellington and this proved a difficulty for the Jordon Club which included two players from the Manurewa Club of the Franklin Association who were also members of the Franklin Junior team competing in the National Junior Teams Tournament. Hillcrest Club were similarly placed with the club team members also members of the Hamilton Junior Team. Both the Jordon and Hillcrest clubs withdrew from the Rothmans Best Club Teams finals.

Endeavours were made to change the dates but to no avail because at that late stage every other Saturday or Sunday clashed with open tournaments of Associations in which some of the players were interested. The New Zealand Executive Committee has been criticised for the planning of the finals of two national events on the same day in the same place but in the planning stages the problem of dual interests of players was not entertained.

It seems ludicrous that players from Franklin, North Shore and Waitemata Associations were eligible to play in Auckland teams as well as in the club teams of their own Associations. From this it is obvious that the rules will need to be spelt out regarding the composition of teams to avoid any future repetition.

The final between Kilbirnie RSA (Wellington) and University (Canterbury) was won by the former by 8 matches to 3. The winning team was Richard Lee, Adrian Lust and Brian Kennedy.

### CENTRAL TV INVITATION TOURNAMENT

The N.Z.B.C. tournament held at the Empire Table Tennis Club rooms, Petone, on Saturday afternoon 22 September was notable for the performance of the 19-year-old Auckland Graham Lassen. Lassen won two of his three singles including the defeat of the New Zealand champion, Richard Lee (Wellington) in three games, 22—20 in the third. However, despite his loss to Lassen, Lee won the tournament by virtue of the fact that he won five games to two against, while Lassen was runner-up with five games for to three against.

James Morris (Northland) was third with two wins although he won only four games and lost four. The most disappointing player was 18-year-old Wayne Adamson from Canterbury. He had beaten both Morris and Lee earlier in the season and on his play at the recent New Zealand Championships at Tauranga looked certain to get at least one win. But he finished on the day with no wins and only one game.

The standard of play was disappointing. The rallies were generally short and often broke down on weak shots. The players looked lethargic. Their approach appeared to be one of an end-of-the-season atmosphere. They never really got into top gear.

Players invited were R. E. Lee (Wellington), J. R. Morris (Northland), W. Adamson (Canterbury) and G. Lassen (Auckland).

Results were:—

R. E. Lee beat J. R. Morris 21—12, 21—15; beat W. Adamson 21—13, 21—16; lost to G. Lassen 18—21, 21—11, 20—22.

G. B. Lassen beat R. E. Lee 21—18, 11—21, 22—20; beat W. Adamson 22—20, 21—15; lost to J. R. Morris 21—14, 18—21, 10—21.

J. R. Morris lost to R. E. Lee 12—21, 15—21; beat W. Adamson 15—21, 21—17, 21—18; beat G. B. Lassen 14—21, 21—18, 21—10.

As a means of putting more competitive spirit into the tournament we are suggesting to the N.Z.B.C. that the current Australian champion be invited to participate and thus provide the international competition of the Australian champion playing against the New Zealand champion and other leading New Zealanders. The Australian championships are held at the same time as the New Zealand championships and the Australian champion would come to New Zealand within a few weeks of winning his title.

### Coaching 1.

### SENIOR TRAINING SQUAD

Following is the report of the Director of Coaching (Mr T. R. D. Flint) on the success of the senior training squad session held 15-17 June:—

"The venue of the training period was at the Frankton Town Hall where conditions were ideal for the squad training. The preparation work by Mr Athol Attwood was excellent and went a long way towards the success of the training, Mr Attwood is to be thanked sincerely.

The training was a great success. If any of the participants were asked, I would be greatly disappointed if they thought otherwise. It went off better than last year. There were several reasons but one was having Alan Tomlinson, who is an experienced player and observer, and Neti Traill in the sessions. They added quality to the practice and observation periods.

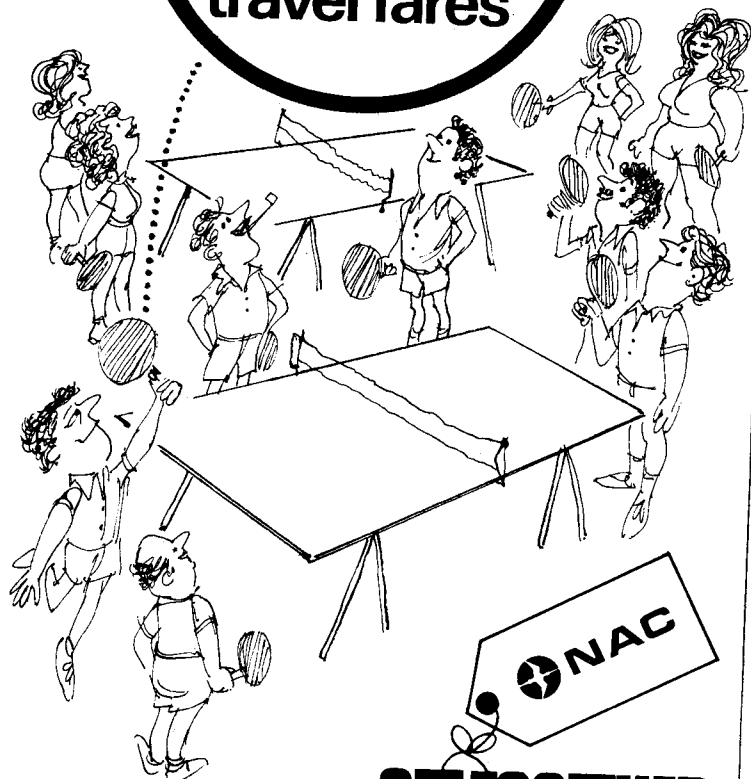
The squad was a particularly good one—all keen to work, concentration good and willingness to co-operate. The training is invaluable to their improvement and if they are able to put into practice a little of what they were shown then it is all worthwhile. It does not matter whether the trainees are young or old for this type of squad, although obviously it is better from a potential angle that they are young because the margin of possible improvement is greater and an older player's reflexes are well recognised as being slower. However, the older players lapse into bad habits that they are usually not aware of and these sessions bring out these weaker points in their game and this is what we work on and then if they are keen it is up to the individual to do something about it.

I have stated this before and repeat that we now have very good young talent in New Zealand. Some of these youngsters certainly have weaknesses in their game but there is plenty of margin for improvement and with keenness, guidance and dedication their game could improve. Incentive is what they need and more of this has been given over the last few years. Players who come under this category are:—

Both schools were directed by the National Director for coaching, Mr T. R. D. Flint, and he reported as follows regarding the conduct of the schools:—

**Boys:** "Because the top three boys K. M. Palmer, M. W. Burrowes and B. M. Attwood were included in the senior training squad there was not quite as much depth of quality in this school. However, this is no cause for concern because it gave more juniors the opportunity of selection for these schools. The talent was there and some of the boys who had been in the previous year's school have shown great improvement since then. Chris Low and Kevin Duffy who were two of the weaker players last year are examples. Generally the boys were well behaved and always willing to ask questions and learn more. The fact that the matches they play are played over the full period has the effect of keeping them on their toes for the full three days. One observation I would like to make is that the standard of the top juniors over the past, say three years, is higher than approximately ten years ago where you only had an odd player capable of challenging the top seniors, Mr Ivan Houghton is to be thanked for his help in tying up arrangements and helping with transport. The Wellington Stadium is an asset to table tennis and when the additional fittings and outside paths etc. are completed it will be better still and certainly the envy of many Associations throughout the country."

**Girls:** "This school was held in the Wellington Stadium and once again Mr Ivan Houghton assisted in arrangements regarding the transport and Mrs Pam Dean and Mr R. J. Magee with the teas and lunches for which they should be thanked. I have always found the girls very keen to learn and this school was no exception. There was good talent and players who had made good headway since last year were C. McGregor, G. Laison, A. Brackenridge and of course Jan Morris who has made tremendous strides forward and is starting to look pretty good and with more experience should be a top-liner. Teresa Bargh another who did well is a very determined player and I feel learned a lot from this period of coaching and should improve. Regarding the programme adopted for these schools I feel that full use of the time available is made and as it is only for three days I do like to make sure that the most is made of it without pushing the pupils too far physically."

### Coaching 3.

#### Other coaching activities:

A live-in coaching seminar was held at Dunedin 5/6 May and at Petone 7/9 May. Both seminars were conducted by the national director of coaching, Mr T. R. D. Flint. At the Dunedin school twenty players selected from nominations received from Southland, Otago, North Otago and South Canterbury Associations, attended. The Director spoke highly of the assistance received from the Otago Association and reported that the innovation of a live-in school was most successful.

At Petone, players came from Manawatu, North Taranaki, Nelson, South Taranaki, Northern Hawkes Bay, Kapiti, Lower Hutt, Wellington, Wairarapa, Wanganui and West Coast Associations. It was another successful seminar. We are satisfied that live-ins provide great encouragement to the players, that everyone benefited and there was a demand for this type of coaching.

A third seminar was to be held in Auckland to cater for the northern part of the North Island but negotiations with the Auckland Coach to undertake the control were unsuccessful mainly due to the fact that the Coach was not interested in mass coaching but preferred selective coaching of a small number which was not the objective of the live-in coaching seminars.

### Coaching 4.

**Future plans for coaching.** Following is a report presented by the Coaching Sub-committee:—

The ideal coaching scheme for New Zealand would be a three tier set-up. The top tier to be the responsibility of the Director of Coaching and would cover the Senior Training Squad, the National Junior Coaching Schools and the regional "live-ins".

The second tier would be at Association level with the duties there of supervising the training of the representative squad and the organising of junior squads and coaching them.

The third tier would be the club coach whose duties would be the introduction of players to the fundamentals of the game and to ensure the continual application of correct basic techniques.

At present the National Junior Coaching Schools continue to provide coaching for the leading juniors, but from time to time they draw criticism because the best juniors are being coached when perhaps more needy players miss out, but the policy for selection is well established. The need to provide greater coaching opportunities at national level was recognised at the 1971 Annual General Meeting when the New Zealand executive was asked to conduct a "live-in" school. The Coaching Sub-committee felt that three live-in schools organised on a regional basis would best capture the spirit of that Annual General Meeting decision. One school, held in Dunedin for the southern associations was an outstanding success and was the subject of many favourable comments from the participating associations. The second "live-in" held in Petone for the central associations was also successful, but a third school to be held in Auckland for the northern associations could not be held owing to difficulties arranging a suitable date. This will be a priority for 1974. There is no doubt that the schools must be repeated next year.

To provide coaching and training for leading players, the squads of the last two years should be repeated. The inclusion of leading juniors in these squads provides incentives for them and does give the more talented juniors the opportunity for more advanced training and coaching. It also means more players can qualify for the National Junior Coaching schools as juniors included in the senior squad are not considered for the junior schools. However, the policy of the senior squads at present is that players meet their own travel costs whereas travel to and from the junior schools is subsidised. It is unfortunate that as things stand, if a junior is invited to attend the senior squad, he would be unable to claim the travel subsidy to which he would be entitled as a player at the National Junior Coaching School.

It is clear that there is now an acceptable amount of coaching at national level, but there is a great need for coaching at association and club levels.

The first step for associations to take is to appoint an official association coach. It is significant that those associations with the greatest potential and who note an upsurge of interest among the younger players, have official coaches.

Once appointed, these coaches should be urged to attend the "live-in" school serving their region for instruction during the course of the school and to observe the National Director of Coaching's handling of the school. There would be the chance of discussions among the coaches in attendance on the many aspects of coaching. An advantage to be gained here is that the coaching methods discussed would give us a fairly consistent approach on the question of coaching methods. Perhaps the formation of a Coaches' Association could well result.

The dates for the "live-ins" have not yet been set, but last year's experience suggests the ideal time to be during the May school holidays and each would be of approximately three days' duration.

On their return home, their first duties would be to conduct classes for club coaches, to pass on the lessons absorbed, as well as the tasks mentioned earlier in this report. He would also be expected to generally supervise the coaching activities in his area.

Clubs are to be asked to ensure the attendance of a club coach at the classes the Association coach will hold and from this point carry out the duties of a club coach as mentioned earlier above.

The Regional Councils, as suggested by the Development Sub-committee of the N.Z.T.T.A., could well observe the coaching progress, or the lack of it, in their area and this could well be one of the topics to be covered in their reports to the New Zealand executive.

### NEW ZEALAND UMPIRES ASSOCIATION

The following report is submitted by the President (Mr K. L. Pointon):—

"The Umpires Association has had a fairly quiet year with not the growth that was hoped would eventuate. The Committee is concerned with the lack of progress and will be making a concerted effort in 1974 to improve the position.

"Although many test papers were distributed, only 15 papers were returned for marking and from these eight candidates qualified as provincial umpires, three failed the theory test and four papers remain to be marked. The Committee would like to see more younger players attempting the theory paper for the questions and answers offer a better appreciation of the laws of the game.

"The Committee is in the process of making out a new list of all qualified umpires, set out in zone grouping. This is to enable members to contact each other and hold meetings at which, we hope, a provincial or zone association will be formed. A big problem at the moment is having the correct addresses on the list we are compiling. Some of the addresses date back to 1955 and are incorrect in a lot of cases. When members receive the new list we would like them to check the information and to advise the Secretary, New Zealand Umpires Association of any corrections.

"It was pleasing to note the number of qualified umpires present at the national championships and every endeavour was made to have all semi-finals and finals matches controlled by a badge umpire. We hope that in the future this will be the case at the North and South Island championships and extending the control to matches in the quarter finals at the national championships.

## PLAYER OF THE YEAR

For her performances at the Second Commonwealth Championships at Cardiff in reaching the semi-finals of the women's singles, for her double success against the two Japanese women players in the final international contest, New Zealand v Japan at Auckland, and for her display of fighting ability and the will to win, the selection committee had no hesitation in adjudging Miss Yvonne Fogarty (Hamilton) as the New Zealand Player of the Year for 1973. Miss Fogarty's successes at the Commonwealth Championships earned her fourth ranking in the Commonwealth, the highest ever ranking for a New Zealand player in international competitions.

At a combined function held in Hamilton in honour of her selection and that of Bain Attwood who was selected as the Junior of the Year, the presentation of trophies was made by the Mayor of Hamilton.

The Player of the Year is an annual award and the following criteria is laid down to assist the selection committee—

Any outstanding performance in the team or individual events at a world championships;

Any outstanding performance against overseas players in international or provincial contests in New Zealand;

Any outstanding performance in an overseas nation's championships;

Any outstanding performance in the team or individual events at the New Zealand championships.

**INTERNATIONAL TOURS****1. Second Commonwealth and 32nd World Championships:**

The official New Zealand women's team of Ann Stonestreet and Yvonne Fogarty met with reasonable success in the team events at the Second Commonwealth Championship held at Cardiff, Wales, March 26 to April 1, winning 4 and losing 2 and beating Singapore in the play off for fifth placing. The New Zealanders lost to Canada 1—3, beat Jersey 3—2, beat Hong Kong 3—0, lost to India 0—3, beat Nigera 3—2 and beat Scotland 3—0. In the individual events Ann Stonestreet was eliminated in the early rounds but Yvonne Fogarty survived to the semi-finals beating K. Senior (Ireland) 21—12, 16—21, 21—11, 16—21, 21—17, and E. Smith (Scotland) 21—15, 20—22, 15—21, 22—20, 21—19 and losing to Jill Hammersley (England) the ultimate winner of the Championships, 11—21, 12—21, 11—21.

The unofficial New Zealand men's team of G. J. Jennings, J. Fisher and D. Couper were outclassed in the teams events winning 1 and losing 6 but beating Mauritius for 13th placing out of a total team entry of 16. The New Zealanders lost to Malaysia 1—5, India 0—5, Scotland 0—5, Nigeria 0—5, Wales 1—5 and Singapore 1—5 and beat Jersey 5—2. In the individual events the New Zealanders were eliminated in the early rounds.

At the World Championships held at Sarajevo, Yugoslavia 5-15 April, the New Zealand women's team in category 2, Group A, beat Hong Kong 3—0 but lost to Canada 0—3, Malaysia 0—3, U.S.A. 2—3 and Bulgaria 0—3. In the play-off for position 9-12 in the category New Zealand beat Hong Kong 3—0, Singapore 3—0 and lost to Greece 1—3. The final placing for New Zealand was 23 out of a total of 40 countries participating. In the individual events the New Zealanders were eliminated early in the singles events although Yvonne Fogarty put up a great fight against the Canadian and American champion, Voiletta Nesukaitis, taking the first and leading 15—11 in the second only to lose the game and the third 19—21. In the women's doubles the New Zealanders reached the last 32 with wins against the top Malaysian pair, the second Indonesians and a Hong Kong pair before losing to a Yugoslavia pair.

In the men's teams events New Zealand beat Lebanon 5—4 but lost to Australia 0—5, Ghana 3—5, Israel 1—5 and Scotland 1—5. In the play-off for positions 9-11 in category 3 New Zealand beat Lebanon 5—4 and lost to Brazil 2—5. The overall final placing was 38 out of a total of 52 competing countries. In the individual events the New Zealanders were eliminated in the early rounds.

The tour was not one of the most successful ventures overseas that New Zealand has had. There were times of disharmony between the girls and there were problems regarding payment of hospitality for some of the unofficial members of the team. Arising from it all it is clear that a Manager should be associated with any future official team from the time of assembly in New Zealand to the conclusion of the tour; that the terms and travel for the tour should be clearly understood by the players before departure and in particular by players and officials who may be attached in an unofficial capacity.

## 2. Visit of Japanese Team:

A comprehensive report on the 1973 Winstone Ltd Japan Table Tennis Tour of New Zealand by Mr A. R. Harding who accompanied the team throughout its tour as the liaison officer has been circulated to all Associations. It will suffice, therefore, if extracts from this report are repeated here. The tour was arranged last April in Sarajevo, Yugoslavia with talks between Mr Keith Bowler (Australia), Mr R. J. Rassie (New Zealand) and Mr I. Ogimura (Japan) and we are very grateful for the negotiations that took place and to the Japan Association for agreeing to send a team comprising one attacking man and one defensive player as well as one attacking woman and one defensive player.

The Japanese team was:—

Men: Toshiaki Furukawa, ranked No. 6 in Japan, Keitaro Sugimoto, ranked No. 16 in Japan. Women: Miss Yoshiko Takase, ranked No. 2 in Japan and Miss Kasumi Inaguma, ranked No. 16 in Japan. The Manager was Mr Takashi Nomura a Director of the Japan Table Tennis Association.

The tour was made all the more successful by the generosity of the sponsors Winstone Limited. Their contribution to the tour expenses relieved much anxiety and consequently less strain, resulting in a more pleasant atmosphere for all. Winstones provided the cars and drivers for the transport by road through the country and met every request with consideration and courtesy. At the farewell function Winstones paid the full wine account at the dinner. The tour was a grand association with the firm and one we hope may be repeated at some future date.

Through the co-operation of the Taumarunui Borough Council who provided a free hall and paid the hotel account for the visitors and the New Zealand party a promotion match was arranged by the Taumarunui Table Tennis Club. The visit served its purpose in awakening interest in the area and already overtures have been made for the acceptance of a Central North Island Association comprising the areas of Taumarunui, Turangi and Taupo.

The two international contests at Wellington and Auckland were televised "live" and captivated a large viewing audience throughout New Zealand. The TV fees also assisted in reducing expenses and offering participating Associations a more realistic guarantee which would not be the stumbling block it has been in the past for Associations to clear a profit.

The report would not be complete without reference to the New Zealand teams. From a 10—0 defeat in the first international, they climbed seemingly unscalable heights in taking Japan to a 6—4 decision in the second international. This was a magnificent feat and one which all New Zealand can be proud of. Of outstanding merit was the performance of Miss Yvonne Fogarty in winning her two singles and this was an achievement which captivated a large viewing audience throughout New Zealand.

## INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS MEETINGS

### 1. Commonwealth Championships:

At the meeting of delegates attending the Second Commonwealth Championships at Cardiff, Wales, on 29 March, 1973, Mr R. J. Rassie represented New Zealand. The election of officers and Management Committee resulted in Mr T. D. Ranga Ramanujan (India) being appointed Chairman and Mr L. Haycroft (Australia) was appointed committee member for Oceania. An application was received from Australia to hold the 1975 Commonwealth Championships and provided a reasonable number of Associations are prepared to travel to Australia it was agreed that the offer to be accepted. The following requests for future option to hold the championships were noted—1977 Jersey and Nigeria; 1979 Canada.

### 2. Biennial General Meeting of the International Table Tennis Federation:

The General Meeting was held in Sarajevo, Yugoslavia and Mr R. J. Rassie represented New Zealand as its delegate. The total full membership of the Federation is 102. A number of decisions were made affecting the Laws of Table Tennis and these have been circulated to all Associations. Under the heading of "Clothing" it was noted that the range of permissible colours is being reviewed to relate it more closely to the colours now available and generally considered acceptable. Any recommendation resulting from the review will be discussed at the 1975 Biennial Meeting. The Rules Committee reported that 87 candidates had applied to become International Umpires. In terms of the rotations agreed upon by Australia and New Zealand, Mr K. C. Wilkinson was elected Vice-president Oceania for the next two years. Mr K. Bowler (Australia) was appointed Secretary of the Propaganda and Publicity Commission.

1977 England, Brighton—confirmed.

1979 U.S.A.

## SPONSORSHIP

Tribute has already been made in this report to the sponsorship of the visit of the Japanese team party by Winstones Limited and it is pertinent to add that without their sponsorship guarantees would have been much higher and beyond many Association's acceptance.

The Rothmans Sports and Cultural Foundation continues to assist the sport of table tennis with the allocation of a sum of \$500 for the advertising rights and support publicity of the Rothmans National Club Teams Tournament.

For the adoption of the Dunlop Barna and Halex table tennis ball in alternate years Dunlop Sports (NZ) Limited and Halex Table Tennis Limited (England) make a grant of \$200 each to be used to offset the expenses of the National Junior Coaching Schools. This arrangement remains in force until the conclusion of the 1974 season.

The N.Z.B.C. has assisted the sport two-fold with television fees and coverage and both aspects play an important part in the development of the sport.

## PERMANENT TROPHIES

We are grateful for the donation of a shield by the Bay of Plenty Association for the "D" grade women's event, inter-association teams competition.

Neville Brightwell's strong ties with the South Island are perpetuated with his choice of the boys' and girls' singles under 16 years events of the South Island Championships for the donation of cups.

## FINANCIAL

The excess of expenditure over income of \$641 is greater than for the previous year. A principle factor in rising expenditure is the increasing cost of travel. However, the short time available for intensive development activities makes air travel the only practical means of assembling players for coaching etc.

It should be noted that there has been a drop of over \$100 in affiliation fees received this year in comparison with last year.

The Development in New Zealand Fund has shown a significant increase during the past year, but mainly as a result of the profits from TV coverage of the Japanese tour of New Zealand. As accent is seen to be on development with such new activities as "live-in" schools and development visits some financial stimulus will be necessary each year to support these activities. Also, the maintenance of a reasonable fund for development will allow the New Zealand Association to provide financial assistance to Associations on a similar basis to the present debenture issues held in the Auckland and Wellington Table Tennis Stadiums. In this regard it is proposed to conduct a national raffle next year with total prizes worth \$5,000. Ticket sales will commence in May with the drawing of prizes in late July. Individual associations will benefit directly by receiving 30c for each \$1 ticket sold.
