



FORTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

TO ALL MEMBERS

The executive committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration, the 48th Annual Report and Statement of Accounts, covering the activities of the New Zealand Table Tennis Association, Incorporated, during the year ended 31 October, 1981.

MEMBERSHIP

It is very pleasing to record the upsurge in school competition and the interest being shown by many Associations. Three hundred and seventy-eight teams in 1981 represents an increase of 55.5% over last year. While the school competition is a non-revue item in the books, it is, nevertheless, the dormitory from where our club members come from and we wish to give every encouragement to the schools to conduct inter-school competitions.

The prestige NZ Summer Games at which top international players from China and Japan competed, and in particular the wholesome coverage of the Games by TV, has had an effect on the school age children, who want to emulate the champions they saw and to experience the enjoyment of playing table tennis.

Our revenue from subscriptions on team figures remain static and the financial return from this source gives little scope to extend our activities. Until table tennis changes its basis of subscriptions to one of a payment by each club member, called a capitation fee, as successfully exploited by every other sport, table tennis will continue to be the cinderella sport.

We need also to tap the family groups and the social players to provide a true record of our membership which in turn increases our revenue. It is clear, therefore, that each Association should undertake a vigorous drive for more clubs and members. It is not sufficient to wait and see what comes. There has to be a personal effort by Associations, by news media advertisements, a house-to-house canvas of selected areas, the support of sports dealers, the provision of facilities and equipment and as said before, beginning with school children and school teachers.

Regular revenue is just as important for each Association as it is to the NZTTA. The first thing that should be done is for each Association to disband the present system of team fees and club fees and introduce a capitation fee per club member. The system has to come in sooner or later and Associations are strongly urged to put their own house in order by setting up a new basis of subscriptions based on every individual contributing.

Thames Valley and South Taranaki still remain in recess and we accept that it is an indictment on the NZTTA that these two areas remain unorganised. An organiser of the ability of Pat Doyle, who has had tremendous success in reviving first the Buller Sub-association and now the Horowhenua sub-association, is obviously wanted in other areas of New Zealand.

SNIPPETS

- *** "Great voluntary effort produces \$150,000 table tennis centre", was the headline that greeted the publicity leading to the opening of the Northland table tennis centre, at Kensington Park, Whangarei, on Saturday 9 May, 1981. Built at a cost of \$70,000, the centre consists of a vast table tennis playing area, which has a new type of construction ply floor and a broken ceiling line, and which accommodates seven tables; a fully-carpeted and furnished lounge area; a committee room; a shop, dressing rooms and showers and a storeroom. Membership of the centre, which enables the holder to obtain keys to the stadium, so that members can make use of the facilities are available to families at a fee of \$50, to senior members \$30 and to junior members \$20. At the official opening of the centre, Life Member, Frank O'Gorman represented the NZTTA. Congratulations to the Northland Table Tennis Association on the acquisition of their new headquarters.
- *** "Interclub merger". The Wellington and Hutt Valley Associations joined together to conduct a 'premier one' grade for the top four teams from each association and a 'premier two' grade for the second four teams. It was considered that the merger would strengthen competition for top players in both areas. The new competition was called the Tisdalls' premier table tennis competition and was sponsored by Tisdalls' Sports Centre.
- *** 14th World Games for the Deaf. Mrs Thelma May was appointed coach of the New Zealand table tennis team for the World Games in Cologne, Germany 23 July to 1 August. Her appointment follows 10 years of success in coaching the Christchurch Deaf Club players. A vice-president of the NZTTA and a life member of the Canterbury Association, Mrs May has coached in schools, taken regular junior classes, as well as coaching for the deaf and paraplegic and disabled. Well done.

NEW ZEALAND JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

(a) Inter-association team contests: The late withdrawal of the Rotorua junior teams because of a domestic dispute within the Rotorua Association, made it necessary to re-programme the draw. The withdrawal of the four teams caused inconvenience and was a nuisance value to the organisers and other teams.

It seemed strange that, because of a difference of opinion, one committee man could withdraw all members of his club from representing Rotorua. Obviously the rights of club members were not being safe-guarded.

Twenty-one boys' and 18 girls' teams, in the under 18 years ago group, and 22 boys' and 15 girls' teams in the under 15 years age group, competed for the junior inter-association teams honours in the respective grades, at the Centennial Hall, McLean Park, Napier, 26/28 August, 1981. The entry of a nationally selected Australian boys and girls team in the under 18 years competition, added interest to the performances of the teams. As to be expected, the Australians were far too strong for the New Zealand provincial teams and were not extended to win the "A" grade competition with an unbeaten record. Apart from dropping two games to Auckland, the Australian boys had a string of 11-0 victories. Similarly, the Australian girls came through losing only 4 matches in a total of 50 played.

It had been previously decided that only New Zealand teams would compete for the Hawkes Bay shields. In the "A" grade competition, the Auckland boys were declared winners for the second year in succession, and likewise, the Hutt Valley girls retained the shield in their grade. In the other grades,

(b) NZ JUNIOR INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

A total of 799 juniors, compared with 813 last year, competed for the individual honours in the four junior age group events.

The Australian junior international team of Karl McKernan, Alois Rosario, Gary Jordan, Shelley Munday, Wendy Hughes and Keri Walsh, replacement for Adele Morrow who had to withdraw on medical advice, collected all the under 18 and under 16 individual titles, except the girls' doubles under 18 which was won by the NZ pair Kadia Rice and Kristen Phillips. It was a takeover of some proportions by skillful youngsters.

Karl McKernan, the Australian junior champion made all the finals in the two age groups and missed out on a double triple crown by losing the mixed doubles under 18 to fellow Australians.

Shelley Munday, the Australian No. 1 also made her presence felt. She eliminated NZ junior representative Kadia Rice, 13-21, 21-16, 21-4 in a semi final upset and then disposed of team mate Wendy Hughes to take the under 18 girls' singles title.

Wendy Hughes completed the triple in the under 16 events, beating Andrea Campbell (NSW) in the final, to team with Aucklander Gina Stapleton to take the girl's doubles and to make a clean sweep with Karl McKernan in the mixed.

Gary Traill (Northland), moving up to the under 14 ranks, continued his NZ title collection, by winning the boys' singles and, with his brother, Murray, the doubles. Gary was a beaten finalist in the mixed.

Taking over from his brother, Murray records his name for the first time as winner of the boys' singles under 12 and to continue his sequence of boys' doubles win, but this time, with Barry Sears of Hutt Valley.

It was a very good championships, well organised and controlled by Tournament Manager, Frank Powell and his assistants.

ASSOCIATION AWARD - BILL HURREY CUP

The award to the Association whose players achieve the most successes in the finals of the junior individual events, was won by the Northland Association. An unusual feature of the award this year was that it was decided on the success of the Traill brothers who dominated the under 14 and under 12 events which events earn less points than for the under 18 and under 16 events.

Had the successes of the Australian players been eligible for the award, Australia with 34 points, the highest ever recorded by an association, could hardly have been bettered.

Points are awarded on the basis of 4 points for the under 18 and under 16 years age group events, with doubles partners sharing the points equally for their Association and 2 points for the under 14 and under 12 years age group events with doubles partners sharing the points.

The final points for the 1981 award were - (Australia 34), Northland 8, Auckland 6, Hutt Valley 6, Bay of Plenty 2 (NSW 2), Franklin 1 and Manawatu 1.

SENIOR INTER-ASSOCIATION TEAMS CHAMPIONSHIPS

The North Taranaki Association can be proud of their teams at the interassociation teams championships held at Napier 31 August/1 September. The campaigners, Christine Sole, Joy Orr, Gwenda Rapley and Lottie Lawrence swept all before them to win the "B" grade without loss and in the promotion/ relegation contest to beat North Shore to earn promotion to "A" grade next year. Not to be outdone, the North Taranaki men won the "D" grade and went on to win the promotion/relegation contest to allow them entry into the higher grade next year.

The Auckland Association continues to dominate the team championships with the men chalking up its sixth successive victory to take the Kean Challenge Shield as the premier province. The Auckland women are doing even better by setting up a formidable record with seven successive victories and so the Herbert G. Teagle Memorial Challenge Shield remains deposited for another year in the Auckland headquarters.

For the first time in the 37 year history of the competition every Association entered teams in the men's competition. Rotorua kept their men's team in and so a record 27 teams competed in the men's competition. Twenty-four teams paid up for the women's competition, but Rotorua subsequently withdrew making the total 23. It was only the second time in the history of the inter-association teams championships that a combined total of men and women's teams had reached 50. The record of 52 teams is recorded when the championships were held at Tauranga in 1970.

In the promotion/relegation contests, Hutt Valley celebrated their return to "A" grade status at the expense of Wellington, while Southland women earned promotion to "C" grade. As a coincident, the winners of the "C" grade in both competitions, failed in their quest for "B" grade status.

VICTOR BARNA DUNLOP CUPS AWARDS

"Cursing and yelling, bad language and outbursts of temperament were far too prevalent amongst the men, and it was very disappointing not to see team coaches and/or managers taking this up with their players at the time".

The above is an extract from the report of the Barna Cup judges. It is an extract that should concern all Associations. It certainly concerns the NZ executive committee. Such mannerisms are not necessary, are not wanted and must be stopped. Stronger disciplinary action is required by team officials to see that the good name of the Association is not marred by players who think that their concentration will improve by loud mouth utterances and wild gestures as a form of self criticism. Such mannerisms are, in fact, a sign of weakness against a better player. Associations should be prepared to deal quickly and firmly with players who bring disrespect to the sport.

"Generally, the ladies teams were much better turned out than the men, and their table etiquette was also better. Apart from one notable exception, sportsmanship was also better. Many players showed lack of manners by not thanking the umpire, - completely ignoring him/her in some cases, and others didn't bother to thank other players or spectators for retrieving dead balls for them". This is another interesting extract from the report and one for Associations to ponder. It would appear that when coaching and training is being undertaken, particularly for younger players, who are the future representatives for the Association, that there should also be a period for discussion on sportsmanship and table etiquette. It should be stressed that sportsmanship and table etiquette are equally important in relation to the technical skills of table tennis.

The Barna Cup judges were Maureen McMillin (convenor), Doris Lassen and Lou Sharman. The judges are to be congratulated for completing a demanding job which involves the two days of the senior men's and women's inter-association teams championships.

NEW ZEALAND NATIONAL OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS

The New Zealand championships were a triumph for NZ representative, James Morris (Northland). He won the men's singles crown for the second time in his career and his success completed the grand slam of winning the North Island, South Island and the New Zealand's men's singles title in the one year, a feat that has only been achieved by three other players in a period of 44 years. Bob Jackson did it in 1955, Bryan Foster in 1968 and Richard Lee in 1974. In the final, Morris beat his doubles partner, Richard Lee 21-19, 21-17, 11-21, 19-21, 21-16.

Karl McKernan, the Australian junior champion, showed his potential when he knocked out the defending champion, Graham Lassen (Auckland), 21-17, 22-20, 19-21, 21-14 in the quarter finals. McKernan, however, found James Morris a harder nut to crack in the semi-final and once Morris had sized up the Aussie in the first game 25-23, it was all his with scores of 21-6, 21-7. Jan Morris (Canterbury) retained her women's singles title beating Debbie Looms (Marlborough) in a final which had interesting possibilities before the match commenced. Having won the North Island and South Island women's singles, Debbie Looms needed the NZ title to become the first women to complete the grand slam. Prior to the

NZ final the players had met four times in the season with Debbie winning each time. A win this time would have given her the NZ singles title for the first time. But it was not to be. In a similar scoring match to the men's singles Jan Morris beat Debbie Looms, 21-19, 21-15, 13-21, 13-21, 21-16.

The experienced pair, Morris and Lee took the men's doubles title for the sixth time in succession when they beat the NZ junior representatives, Alan Pedley (Franklin) and Alan Shewan (Hamilton), 21-13, 21-12, 21-19. It was a meritorous effort by the youngsters who, unseeded, had come through to the final.

Jan Morris also annexed the women's doubles with Angela Brackenridge while Debbie Looms was a beaten finalist in the mixed doubles.

A comprehensive report on the conduct of the championships, by the NZ liaison officer, Mr A.R. Harding has been circulated to all Associations. The following quote from the report correctly assessed the outcome - quote, "In my opinion, the championships were a success. With each passing season, the event is becoming more and more demanding on officials. I thought Hawkes Bay coped exceedingly well and I offer my congratulations to Frank Powell and his team"., unquote.

The younger players, Pam Shadbolt and Barbara Fogarty, kept the issue alive with a win each over the experienced Wellingtonian, Ann Gyongyos. South Island took all four doubles to square the contest at 6 matches all. The count back found the games equal at 15 each and continuing the count back North Island was declared the winner by 557 points to 553.

The North Island men, who were all current New Zealand representatives, had too much experience and won their contest easily by 11 matches to 1.

The annual inter-island contests were played at Napier on Tuesday evening, 1 September, at the same time as the junior international contest between Australia and New Zealand. There was a clash of interest for the spectators and more chose to watch the international rather than the inter-island contest. Inter-island representation is second only in prestige to New Zealand representation and a counter attraction on the same night and at the same time, detracts from the merit of selection.

NORTH ISLAND CHAMPIONSHIPS

MEN

A good quality entry was received for the North Island championships, sponsored by Coca-Cola Bottlers and conducted by the Hamilton Association at the Hamilton Stadium on Friday - Sunday 3-5 July, 1981.

A total of 758 entries were received, compared with 647 the previous year. There was a 4.73% increase in the senior age group events and there was a 20.3% increase in the junior events.

An exciting men's singles final between James Morris and Barry Griffiths pleased the 350 spectactors. In a close 5-game match, Morris beat Griffiths, 21-13, 21-18, 14-21, 20-22, 21-16 and completed the second leg of the grand slam, South Island, North Island and NZ men's singles, which was to be his in 1981.

In a brilliant display, Debbie Looms accounted for the NZ junior representative, Kadia Rice 21-13, 21-15, 21-13 and she also took the second leg of the grand slam which was going to elude her at the NZ championships.

Morris and Lee took the men's doubles for the second year in succession and for the sixth time since their first success in 1974.

Ann Gyongyos and Kristen Phillips upset the established pair of Morris and Brackenridge in a long five game match 21-16, 9-21, 21-14, 18-21, 22-20 to score a well deserved win in the women's doubles final.

Richard and Christine Lee put paid to the efforts of juniors, Griffiths and Rice to annex the mixed doubles title.

In the junior events, Barry Griffiths, Wendy Cuthbert and Gary Traill were outstanding in the under 18, 16 and 14 years age groups respectively. All three were titleholders for the singles, doubles and mixed doubles events.

Twelve tables were used and the space between tables and back space was quite adequate. It is a pity that the excellent facilities are marred by a concrete floor which, with its non yield material and slippery nature can be harmful to players.

Mr John Lelliott was the NZ liaison officer at the championships and he has reported that the championships were well organised with Bruce Shewan the tournament manager and his 20 assistants working extremely hard over a long weekend.

Mr Lelliott also submitted guidelines to follow for future organisation of North Island championships and stressed the necessity to commence the junior events earlier to avoid the late finishes being experienced in these events.

SOUTH ISLAND CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Trafalgar Centre, Nelson, the venue of the 1981 South Island championships, attracted entries from Auckland, Manawatu, Hutt Valley and Wellington as well as South Island Associations. As a result, entries increased by 39.3% as compared with the entries received for the 1980 championships held at Timaru.

James Morris (Northland) won his first South Island title when he defeated Malcolm Darroch (Manawatu), the former NZ junior representative, 21-11, 19-21, 21-9, 21-15 in the final. On his way to the final, Morris survived a tense semi-final against the Canterbury left-hander, John Richards. Richards was two games up and held match point in the fourth, but was unable to clinch the match.

Debbie Looms (Marlborough) continued her mastery in the South Island of the New Zealand champion, Jan Morris. In a tight, closing scoring match, the scores being 21-23, 22-20, 21-19, 21-19, Looms won her fourth successive South Island women's title.

Mr John Lelliott, the NZ Liaison Officer in his report on the conduct of the championships, commented, quote, "These four people worked non-stop for the two days and deserve full credit for running a very important tournament. It must be one of the smallest committees ever to run a tournament of this size", unquote.



OPEN CLUB TEAMS TOURNAMENTS:

North Taranaki and Wanganui Associations and the Levin Club continue to hold open club teams tournaments which obviously has benefit for the participants.

For the Levin Club it is the big event of the year and it is interesting to record how it started. In 1968, the Levin Club decided that, as there was no organised competition for lower grades in teams events, an annual event for 'A', 'B', 'C' and 'D' grade players should be introduced. The first year opened with an entry of 9 teams and grew in size till the club was forced to seek a bigger venue. The event was, therefore, transferred to the Manawatu Association's headquarters in Palmerston North. Forty-eight teams can now be accepted and in some years it has been necessary to ballot entries. After experimenting with 3 and 4 men teams, it was found that composite teams of 3 were the most popular, playing nine singles in a period of $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours. After paying expenses, the tournament has always shown a small profit to the Club.

For the 1981 competition, 48 teams were accepted, with entries coming from North Taranaki, Wanganui, Hawkes Bay, Wellington and Manawatu. Wrightcars Levin Ltd associated themselves with the tournament, thus enabling top quality prizes to be given for all grade winners and runner-up teams.

INTER SCHOOL TEAMS TOURNAMENT

NORTH ISLAND TOURNAMENT:

Mr Alan Costley of the Hutt Valley Association has kindly supplied the following report on the conduct of the North Island Secondary and Intermediate/Primary Schools teams tournament.

SECONDARY SCHOOLS

A disappointing entry of seven teams from five colleges in the Hutt Valley, I college from Wellington, I college from Kapiti competed for the secondary schools title held at the Empire Club, Petone on Saturday 3rd October, 1981. By telephone calls every endeavour was made to attract greater entries from North Island secondary schools, but for different reasons, travelling costs, coming so soon after the New Zealand nationals, examinations, Summer sports, late receipt of entry forms, they were all declined. It could be that a more central venue, e.g. Palmerston North, Taihape, Taupo, Tokoroa, Rotorua would even up the travelling costs and be more acceptable. As the guidelines for the

holding of the school teams tournament will be submitted to the NZ Annual General Meeting for approval, the opportunity will be taken to discuss the future of the school tournaments to find a more equitable basis as a format.

For the 1981 tournament all teams consisted of 3 players and all were boys. There was no sponsorship, only a few spectactors and the results were published in the Wellington 'Evening Post'. Mr Ron Menchi a member of the NZ executive committee made the opening introductory remarks.

The contests themselves were very close. No team was unbeaten and a countback on games was necessary to find the winner. The winning team, Wellington College was captained by the nationally selected junior, Robert Kerr, who was unbeaten in singles play. His team mates, Craig Richardson and Paul Wood were under 15 representatives this season for Wellington and Hutt Valley repsectively.

Hutt Valley Memorial Technical College (Albert Young, (Captain) which beat Wellington College in the first round looked the likely winner until the final round when it went down narrowly to Taita College, necessitating the countback on games. Hutt Valley High School (Mark Harris (Captain) won the consolation event.

INTERMEDIATE/PRIMARY SCHOOLS

The entry was eight teams from eight schools, 5 in the Hutt Valley, 1 from Auckland, 1 from North Shore and 1 from Wellington. Although this was also a disappointing entry, with several districts prominent in junior developement not represented, despite advance effort by telephone to obtain entries, the tournament was very successful. The tournament was held at the Empire Club, Petone on Sunday 4th October. The teams consisted of 3 players but only included one girl. It would appear that it is necessary to introduce a separate girls school teams tournament to ensure that encouragement is given to girls to play table tennis.

Mr A.R. Harding, national executive chairman opened the tournament which commenced at 9.25 a.m. Three qualifying rounds of contests with teams divided into two sections of four were held. This was felt necessary because the relative standards of teams was largely unknown. Similar to the secondary schools event, the top four qualifying teams then formed an 'A' grade to compete on a round robin basis for the Peter Andsell shield and the other four teams competed for the consolation position.

A formula of seven matches was established for each contest comprising five singles and two doubles with each player taking part in three of these matches. This system reflected a true team result. Also, the younger players were not over-worked and did not tire noticeably in the later stages as they may have done in an eleven-match formula.

The Wairau (North Shore) and Mt Roskill (Auckland) teams were managed by Mr and Mrs Tom Brown of North Shore. These teams had previously finished first and second in the local Auckland competition (from over 40 teams).

The matches themselves were played in a good spirit and in the final round two unbeaten teams met, Wairau (Captain, Murray Brown) and Hutt (Captain, Michael McCleary). After a contest of fluctuating fortunes, Wairau eventually won by the narrow margin of 4-3. Murray Brown the successful captain is very talanted and was unbeaten in the singles and doubles. He was well supported by Phillip Mason and Peter Young. It is pleasing to record that all eight teams were supported and assisted by a school teacher or parent during the day. Considerable interest was shown in the tournament and several other spectactors also attended.

Afterwards, Mr Harding released the results to the national media and these appeared in the Wellington 'Evening Post'.

Entries: One school in each section was eligible from each Association (maximum 8). Five entries in both the Secondary and Intermediate/Primary Section from West Coast, Canterbury, South Canterbury, Otago and Southland competed. West Coast subsequently withdrew from the secondary schools section. There was an entry fee of \$65 per team, returnable on a mileage basis, e.g. Canterbury received a refund of \$203.00, West Coast \$157.30, South Canterbury \$143.60 and Otago \$67.40.

Composition of

teams: All teams comprised boys.

Sponsorship: The Invercargill Licensing Trust sponsored the secondary schools section for \$100 to the winner and \$50 to runner-up. There was no sponsor for the Intermediate/Primary school section but the Southland Association provided a photo stand as a prize. Each member of the winning team received a small

table tennis trophy.

Other than the organisers, billet hosts and one or two people Spectators:

who knew someone involved, there was no-one else.

Publicity:

There was a good coverage before and after the event in the Southland Times. A photographer arrived on the day.

Information was given to the radio but was not broadcast.

Supervision:

All teams, except Otago and the Southland secondary school

team had an adult in charge.

Comments:

In the intermediate/primary section both the winner, Westport South Primary and Timaru Marist were outstanding teams for their age. The Westport Primary team had the advantage of playing together at the New Zealand championships.

In the secondary school section the presence of Michael Prisk the Canterbury junior representative, in the Cashmere High School team made the difference.

At a meeting of South Island Associations held in June, it was decided that a central venue (previously, Christchurch had always been the venue) was not the best and a rotation of all Associations would create interest in many areas. The system of travel subsidy was the same as used for the South Island inter-association teams tournament. It was also agreed that West Coast should conduct the South Island tournament in 1982.

TABLE TENNIS CENTRES

New Zealand is well endowed with provincial centres, stadiums and clubs built to provide table tennis facilities exclusively. Starting from the top of the North Island, there is the newly built Northland table tennis centre in Whangarei. Moving southwards, the biggest stadium of them all, recently damaged by fire, is standing in Gillies Avenue, Auckland. To the west of Auckland, the Waitemata Stadium serves the area; then to Franklin where the Manurewa Club stands. Moving to the centre of the Island, the Hamilton Stadium or is it the A.K. Attwood Stadium, shines out as a monument to the

In the Wellington regional area, Kapiti recently obtained a semi-permanent headquarters by leasing a portion of the NZ Kennel Club's building for the winter season; Petone has the Empire Club, probably the first table tennis club to own its own building free of debt and to complete the North Island, the Wellington Association has its headquarters at the Wellington Stadium.

Across the strait, Canterbury boasts of its own headquarters in Christchurch. In the deep South the Otago Association has its own stadium and finally at the bottom of the South Island, there is the stadium at Invercargill.

In addition to these 'own-your-own' centres, there are community sports complexes, in which table tennis funding has helped to establish. These sports stadiums are, the recently opened Manawatu Sports Stadium in Palmerston North, the Wanganui Sports Stadium and the Aorangi Sports Stadium in Timaru.

There are other places such as the Sportsdrome in Rotorua, the Queen Elizabeth Youth Centre, Tauranga, the Centennial Hall in Blenheim and the Trafalgar Centre in Nelson that have been used for major table tennis championships. In this category there are probably other local buildings which serve as a similar community outlet.

THE AUCKLAND FIRE

A 16-year old Mt Eden youth was charged with setting fire to the Auckland Table Tennis stadium in the early morning hours on Sunday 23 October, 1981. Firemen from 11 engines fought the blaze which caused \$30,000 in damage to offices, floors, walls and the roof near the stadium entrance. The complete administration block was destroyed, taking with it all the records dating back to 1930, gestetner machine, typewriter, canteen equipment, trophies and other mementos. Among the trophies lost were the Arthur Meachen Memorial Cup and the Arnold Percy Memorial Trophy. The building was insured.

COACHING

Peter Hirst

Published in the 1981 NZ Championship programme, was a very good article, "Coaching the key to the future" by Merv Allardyee, the convenor of the NZTTA coaching sub-committee. Extracts are repeated in this report, particularly about the role which Peter Hirst, the English national coach has played, during his three contract engagements with the NZ Association commencing in 1979 and the follow-up in 1980 and 1981.

Quote,

"The main thrust of Peter's visits has been the coaching of coaches and over 200 coaches have attended these seminars. As a result of his visits and on his advice the N.Z.T.T.A. has formulated a tiered scheme along the following lines:

- 1. Each club having at least one coach,
- 2. Each Association having an official coach,
- New Zealand being divided into seven regions each with its own Regional Coach,
- 4. The apex of the structure will be a Director of Coaching whose responsibilities will include the coaching of the National Senior and Junior squads and the conducting of seminars for coaches.

At each level of the coaching structure there will be a learning and assisting element built into the programme, e.g. an association player who attends a regional squad will learn at the regional level and assist fellow players at his association and club level.

The ultimate aim is that an association player must be selected for a regional squad by his association. Attendance at the regional squad will be a pre-requisite for selection in the National squad and attendance in the National squad will be a pre-requisite for selection in a National team.

What progress has so far been made?

Peter Hirst has introduced us to a simple but very effective approach to coaching. During his three visits he has conducted several seminars for the training of coaches and it is very pleasing to note that most associations have had representatives attend one or more of these seminars. We now have a strong nucleus of coaches who can competently operate at club and association level. At this stage we are a little thin at Regional level and we do not have a coach available to adequately train a National Senior Squad.

NATIONAL COACH

The Allardyce report says, quote "we do not have a coach to adequately train the national squad. We also do not have a person with the time and expertise to liaise with existing coaches to assist them overcome their coaching problems. One of the themes which came through very strongly in discussions at the Peter Hirst's seminars for coaches, was that we desperately need a national coach (or Director of Coaching or whatever title might be appropriate)", unquote.

Last year we submitted to Associations, the type of portfolio which it was intended to use to attract a sponsor, who would pay \$20,000 or more by way of sponsorship of the New Zealand national table tennis coach, for an on-going term of three years.

Comments were sought from Associations and from the ll replies received it was established that:-

- most associations supported the concept in principle, but some had reservations about the level of commitment;
- in the main there was a view that the NZTTA should not commit
 Associations to agreements relating to advertising in or outside
 Associations or club halls, in printed material or in regard to other
 sponsors.

The Coaching sub-committee believed that it was possible to meet these requests without seriously undermining the effectiveness of the proposals. Accordingly, certain items of the portfolio were changed so that they relate mainly to the matters in which the NZ Association has authority. At this stage, details of the negotiations, for this major undertaking by a sponsor, cannot be published, but it can be taken that progress is being made.

REGIONAL COACHING

Three regional seminars for associations coaches were held during the year. The northern seminar at Hamilton 22-24 May, central at Wanganui 8-10 May and the southern at Dunedin on 1-3 May. The three seminars were conducted by Peter Hirst. In addition time was allowed at each centre for Peter Hirst to undertake promotional work such as simplified courses for club coaches, attendance at schools and other junior activity.

A member of the NZ coaching sub-committee attended each of the regional coaching seminars. Ron Menchi also took the opportunity of visiting the Southland Association to meet the executive for discussions to mutual advantage.

Three regional coaching schools for juniors were also arranged. The northern school was held at the Waitemata Stadium under the direction of Graham Lassen, the central school at the Kapiti Association's new premises in Porirua under the direction of Paul Escott and the southern school in the Otago Association's stadium under the direction of Ron Garrett. Following are extracts from the report by Paul Escott on the central school -

"Twenty pupils attended the sessions and all were found to be keen to learn, hard working, good listeners and punctual. The age group was between 12 and 17 years.

The new Kapiti Association centre was ideal for the holding of the school with ten tables, flourescent lighting and painted concrete floor. Each session commenced with approximately ten minutes of physical exercises where it became obvious that a number of the trainees who faded quickly were unfit.

During the weekend all the basic skills were covered and on-the-table routines undertaken to emphasise the various points. Relatively simple routines were tackled in the early sessions with the degree of difficulty being increased as the course progresses.

It was perhaps a little disappointing that there was no one representing the NZ Association at the opening or closing of the school. Dave Cook a member of the NZ executive committee, was, however, present at a couple of the sessions and his attendance was welcome.

Ron Garrett reported as follows on the southern regional coaching school at $\operatorname{Dunedin}$.

quote "20 trainees from the Canterbury, Mid-Canterbury, Otago and Southland associations were present.

Basically the first two sessions involved general consistency on control, centred around the four basic stokes. The third and fourth and fifth sessions involved exercises of recovery, with an increased effort by players. Service was also discussed for one period. The later sessions included the development of power into the game adding the use of spin as progress was made. The final session involved the structuring of the rally which most of the players found difficult to carry out properly.

The fitness of players was not as high as expected from 13-18 year olds and became obvious when players were asked to put more effort into the game and couldn't do so for any length of time.

The stroke play and general play was good but control, speed and concentration need a lot of work if the players intend to reach a high standard." unquote.

There was no report from Graham Lassen on the northern regional school.

THE NITTAKU NATIONAL JUNIOR COACHING SCHOOLS

Sponsored by the manufacturers of NITTAKU table tennis equipment, the twenty-third national junior coaching schools for boys and girls was held at the Barber Hall, Palmerston North during the period Tuesday/Friday, 12-15 May 1981. It was a combined coaching school, directed by New Zealand regional and other selected coaches, under the supervision of the English national coach, Peter Hirst.

In his report, Peter Hirst named Neti Traill, Dave Cook, Malcolm Darroch, Michael McAvinue and Shona Cudby as the staff involved in the training and organisation of the school.

As general comments Peter said, quote, "The camp was designed to show players how to develop natural skills and an ability to understand the structuring of rallies. Some technical work was undertaken with a small emphasis on service and receive. One physical session per day at the end of the day for a period of 20 minutes was undertaken", unquote.

Visitors to the school included Nelson Tizard, President of the NZTTA and tour manager of the NZ junior team to the Australian championships. Discussion took place to establish some ground rules for training camps in general as well as tours undertaken by national teams. The players were invited to express their opinions.

Peter Hirst submitted an appraisement on each player at the school and these assessments were forwarded to the trainee's association so that the association coach may be in a position to assist the player to improve his or her technique.

SENIOR SQUAD TRAINING

As part of the assembly procedure, for members of the New Zealand team attending the Novi Sad (Yugoslavia) World Championships, an attempt was made to hold a senior training squad at the Manurewa Town Hall for the weekend 27-29 March, 1981. From the start there were problems, in deciding upon the venue, the late arrival in New Zealand of Peter Hirst, the late decision to send the NZ world championship team to Australia to attend a training camp, the difficulty in finding a suitable coach to undertake the training and the failure of a number of leading players to take up the invitation, either by not replying or by being unavailable. The holding of the senior squad training session was, therefore cancelled.

COACHING MANUAL

A coaching manual, based on the Englishsystem, prepared by Dave Cook, from material presented by Peter Hirst, has proved to be a best seller, with the original print of 120 copies being sold out. Demand for copies has meant a reprint and it is expected that further copies will be available in the new year.

NEW ZEALAND ASSOCIATION OF NATIONAL SPORTS COACHES

The New Zealand Association held a conference in Wellington 27-30 October, 1981 on "The Principles of Coaching". Guest speakers were Arthur Lydiard the New Zealand International athlete coach, Dr Geoff Gowan, Technical Director of the Coaches Association of Canada, Professor David Russell, Director of the Otago University School of Physical Education. Table Tennis was represented at the conference by Ron Garrett, Paul Escott and Dave Cook.

TABLE TENNIS AWARDS -

for proficiency in training skills (open to all players under 21 years of age).

Bronze test programme:

Candidates to own a good quality bat, be correctly dressed at the time of the tests and to have shown some evidence of club participation. The candidates are required to demonstrate a correct service and to show how to execute forehand and backhand topspin and chop services; to be proficient at returning 20 backhand pushes; backhand half volley, topspin roll; combined control and to be able to answer general knowledge questions about table tennis.

There are two more advanced stages of proficiency in which SILVER and GOLD certificates are issued to successful candidates.

During the year, the Auckland Association conducted examinations for the bronze test with Richard Lee as the examiner. He was assisted with the feeding of shots with the question and answer section by Christine Lee, Jack Ahlquist and Bill Burns.

Therefore, we would like to pay tribute to Peter Hirst for the important part he has played in setting up a coaching structure in New Zealand. Peter was good at his job. He had a pleasing personality and he was a motivator. We enjoyed having Peter and in return Peter has said that he liked being in New Zealand. Well done, Peter and thank you very much for your interest in our affairs.

NZ TOP 16 TOURNAMENT

The idea of holding a top 16 tournament for men, women, boys and girls, was first moved by the Hutt Valley Association and discussed at the 1981 NZ annual general meeting. A decision was reached that the NZ executive committee should investigate the holding of a top 16 tournament and to report back to the next annual general meeting.

The investigation became unnecessary when, the Auckland Association decided to hold a top 16 tournament. The preliminary costing showed that, to provide a subsidy on air fares, meeting other travel expenses and prize money, sufficient to attract the top players, a budget of \$650 would be required just to organise a men's tournament. If the women were also to be included, the cost would double and to add boys and girls would be impossible. As a result, it was decided to hold a top 16 men's singles tournament only.

Sponsors were not forthcoming and the name of the tournament was given to Metropolitan Life Insurance, a company that has entered into a generous arrangement with the Auckland Association over the next few years.

PLAYER OF THE YEAR

For his achievement in winning the North Island, South Island and New Zealand men's singles in the one season and his general consistency of performances in New Zealand, earned James Morris (Northland) the prestige Player of the Year award. This was the second occasion in which Morris had won the award, the previous time being in 1976.

It is interesting to note that, when this award was introduced in 1955, the first winner was Bob Jackson (Auckland) and the citation was, "for the winning of the New Zealand, North Island and South Island singles title in the one year, in a clear-cut and decisive manner".

At a special function arranged by the Northland Association, the Player of the Year trophy and memento was presented to James Morris by NZ life member, Errol Cheal.

HISTORY OF THE AWARD

Through the generosity of the English Table Tennis Association, the net proceeds of the international contest England v New Zealand at Winchester, England in 1954, amounting to approximately 50 sterling pounds, was donated to the New Zealand Association. Using part of these funds, it was decided to introduce a Player of the Year Award based on a similar presentation conducted by the English Association. A handsome trophy was purchased and the first award was made to R.V. Jackson of Auckland in 1955

INTERNATIONAL TOURS AND OTHER OVERSEAS ACTIVITY

New Zealand Summer Games

With the object of providing top level international competition for New Zealand competitors who missed the Moscow Olympics, the Government sponsored the 1981 New Zealand Summer Games. The Games were held in conjunction with the Pacific Conference Track and Field Games at Christchurch. Contests in nine sports were also held at five centres throughout New Zealand between 21 January and 1 February. The NZ Games festival was covered by NZ Television with 50 hours 'live' coverage over the 10 days.

Table Tennis was included as one of the sports and invitations were extended to the top international countries to send their world ranked players to compete in the team and individual events. A generous air travel subsidy and full internal hospitality was offered.

Hungary, Czechoslavakia and England declined the invitation as their players were fully occupied with other international engagements. However, table tennis did get the top players from China and Japan, who, together with representatives from

Indonesia, Australia, Canada and New Zealand competed in the biggest international table tennis tournament ever to be held in New Zealand.

A strong organising committee with members from Auckland, Franklin, North Shore and Waitemata left nothing to chance in the splendid organisation that resulted. The tournament was held in the Air New Zealand stadium, Auckland and the atmosphere was conducive to good table tennis which showed through magnificently as television beamed the games through the country's network. Indeed one spectacular table tennis rally was featured as part of the introduction to the NZ Games sports news of the day.

China fielded the the current national champion, Cai Zhenhua, 19 Jiang Jialiang 16, Yang, Chuanning 21 and Xu, Yi, 23, all strong contenders for the China men's team to compete at the World Championships in April. Yan, Guili, 25, runner-up in both doubles at the 1979 Worlds, joined Huang, Junqun, 18 and Chen Jieling, 17 to represent the high standard of women's play in China.

Heading the Japan men's team was 24-year-old Hiroyuki Abe, the current home champion and he was supported by Kenichi Sakamoto, 22, 3rd ranked in Japan and Kashyn Fukuda, 18, the All-Japan High Schools champion. The women were led by Emiko Kanda, the national champion and was supported by the youngsters, Hitomi Fukuda Noriko Fukuda and Rumi Obana.

Canada, Indonesia, Australia and New Zealand had their leading international stars.

With superb control and power hitting, China were supreme when they brilliantly won the team contests against Japan. The men won 5-1 and the womend 5-3.

Cai showed a new dimension for New Zealand players, with the constant twirling of his racket cleverly disguising the combination rubber he was using. His match against the Japanese No. 1, Abe, gave the public and television everything they expected, with spin, half volleys, smashing drives, counter drives and prolonged rallies of the competitive-like never before seen in New Zealand.



In the individual events, the might of China was demonstrated most convincingly, when their players, in monotonous procession, stood on the victory dais as winners of all five events. Cai won the men's singles, again beating Abe (Japan) and also featured in the men's doubles and mixed doubles events.

36th World Table Tennis Championships

Losing to Singapore 2-5 in the opening team contest at the 36th World championships at Novi Sad, Yugoslavia, cost New Zealand men dearly in the final team placing. Singapore improved their position by 4, whereas New Zealand dropped three places, to finish at 39 out of a total of 59 countries.

New Zealand women did not fare so well in the section play, winning 2 and losing 5, but in the cross over contests, to determine the final positions, beat USA 3-2 thus reversing the 2-3 loss experienced in the opening contest. This win placed New Zealand ahead of USA at 27 out of a total of 51 countries and represented a gain of 2 places over the previous world rating. In the same team category as New Zealand there were some spectacular rise and fall of countries. Austria gained 11 places, USA and Ireland, both beaten by New Zealand, moved down 10 places. Australia also fell behind New Zealand dropping three places. New Zealand women can, therefore be satisfied with their final placing.

The men's team consisted of, Richard Lee (Auckland) (Captain), Malcolm Temperley (North Shore) and Barry Griffiths (Auckland). The women's team was Jan Morris (Canterbury) (Captain) and Shelley Palmer (Auckland). Kadia Rice (Bay of Plenty), the originally selected non-travelling reserve, was later given permission to travel with the team on the understanding that she paid all the expenses involved. The team manager was Keith Pointon. New Zealand players made no impression in the individual events with the men failing to get past the qualifying rounds in the singles events or losing the first match played in the doubles events. The women fared little better except that Shelley Palmer did win her first round match, only to be outclassed by the more experienced Japanese player R. Wade in the next round -8, -3, -7.

Consolation events were held for players losing their first game in the qualifying rounds, but not from the draw proper. Barry Griffiths won a bronze medal when he lost to Florescu (Rumania) in the final. Similarly Kadia Rice won a bronze medal when she too lost in the final of the women's Section.

Prior to travelling to Yugoslavia, the New Zealand team party linked up with the Australian squad for seven days training in Melbourne, under the direction of the Australian national coach, Mike Johns. An extensive programme kept the players training for 6 - 8 hours per day. Mr Pointon wrote in his report, quote, "This eight day build-up to the Worlds was of great value", unquote.

Travelling with the Australians meant substantial savings in costs and we are grateful to the Australian Association in accepting the New Zealand players for training and for the arrangements made with the Yugoslavia airlines for the travel to Belgrade and return. The Manager of the New Zealand team, Mr K.L. Pointon worked hard in obtaining sponsorship of equipment and gifts fc~ the team members. International Table Tennis Federation

Seventy-nine countries, plus 3 proxies and ITTF officers, attended the biennial General Meeting of delegates at the Parliament Hall, Novi Sad, Yugoslavia on 18 and 24 April, 1981.

New Zealand was represented by its delegate, Keith Pointon, who submitted a full report and observations about the Congress meeting. The report was circulated to all Officers and Associations.

World Championship Options

The following options were noted, with the first two being confirmed:

1983 Tokyo, Japan

1985 Gothenburg, Sweden

1987 England, Hungary, India, South Korea

1989 England, Hungary, Japan, USA

Both India and South Korea felt that it was not right for the championships to be held consecutively in the same regional area, so withdrew their applications for 1985 in favour of Sweden.

Laws of Table Tennis

There were a number of changes to the Laws of table tennis and these will take effect in New Zealand from 1 January, 1982. An order has been placed with the ITTF for leaflets outlining the complete Laws including the amendments to date. The leaflets should be available in the New Year for distributing to all Associations and practising qualified umpires.

New Zealand Juniors In Australia

New Zealand boys and girls had major successes at the Australian junior championships played at the Kingsborough Sports Complex, Kingston, Tasmania, 31 May to 5 June, 1981.

The boys team was undefeated and the girls took second place, losing only to Victoria and New South Wales. Peter Jackson was a losing finalist in the boys' singles to Karl McKernan, 17 -18, -20 but with Barry Griffiths won the boys doubles title. Kadia Rice won the girls singles title and with Barry Griffiths also took the mixed doubles title. It was the most successful NZ junior team to tour Australia.

Following are extracts from the report submitted by the Coach Geoff Rau:-

"Barry Griffiths had an excellent teams tournament going through undefeated. In fact only three players caused him any concern at all, Iran (Sth Aust), Haberl (NSW) and McKernan (Vict.) and only the latter pushed him the whole way.

Peter Jackson improved on his last year's performance, losing only four singles. Especially pleasing were his three singles wins against Victoria which included McKernan who he beat 21-11, 18-21, 21-15, and his easy victory over Haberl in the NSW contest in a match that proved the turning point in this contest.

Kadia Rice also improved on her last visit to Australia, dropping only two singles to Bisiach and Munday of Victoria.

In the individual events, Peter Jackson's effort in reaching the final of the boys singles was outstanding, because in doing so he eliminated both the 4th and 1st seed (Schreenan and Haberl) and a player he had not previously beaten, Iran (South Australia). Peter had his chances in the final against McKernan and led 18-14 in the third game before finally going down 20-22.

Barry Griffiths appeared to be on his way to the final in the other half of the draw until he met McKernan, who likes to hit hard for winners. In a remarkably low scoring match, McKernan beat Griffiths 21-6, 7-21, 21-6.

The best performance in the individual events, however, came from Kadia Rice who beat Wendy Hughes in the semi-final of the girls singles, 13-21, 21-16, 21-18 and went on to beat the No. 2 seed Bisiach in the final 21-19, 18-21, 22-20 to take the title.

JUNIOR INTERNATIONAL CONTESTS

New Zealand boys surprised with a clear-cut win over Australia by 8 matches to 3 in the first ever junior international contest between New Zealand and Australia held at the Centennial Hall, McLean Park, Napier on Tuesday evening, 1 September 1981.

Led by an inspired Peter Jackson, the New Zealanders never looked likely to be headed and it was all over at 6-2 with the last three singles still to be played. Playing with confidence, Peter Jackson won his three singles easily. His 3 - game victory over Karl McKernan, the Australian junior champion was a good one. Earlier McKernan had won the New Zealand under 16 and under 18 boys' singles title and his loss in the international contest was the only one he sustained in the junior section of the championships. Peter also accounted for Alois Rosario, who had previously beaten him in the semi-final of the NZ boys' under 18 singles event.

Both Alan Shewan and Alan Pedley kept up the pressure and Shewan's defeat of Victorian Rosario added to the discomfort in the Australian camp. New Zealand took both doubles to record an unexpected 8-3 victory.

The girls' contest went to Australia 7-4. New Zealand led in the early stages 3-1 but failed to score in the second half of the singles and doubles and only managed to pick up the last singles when Kadia Rice beat Keri Walsh. The disappointment was Wendy Cuthbert who lost her three singles without extending the Aussies. Kadia Rice held her own but succumbed to the No. 1 Australian Shelley Munday. Kristen Phillips took a captain's revenge when she beat Munday 21-14, 28-26, in an exciting match in which Kristen displayed determination and fighting ability. The doubles were shared.

The Manager was Bryan Keane and the players were, Mark Maloney, Paul Gray, Greg Bellamy and Carl Francks. The team visited Newcastle, Canberra, Goulburn, Campletown, Blacktown, North Sydney and Roselands, playing matches, enjoying the sightseeing and kind hospitality. "The tour was a success in many ways", wrote Bryan in his report, "The boys' games will improve with the experience. There was one thing - most Australians use 'funny' rubber of some sort or other. This proved to be too much for our boys to combat".

New South Wales Touring Women's Team

Prior to competing at the New Zealand championships, the Auckland Association organised a short tour for a New South Wales women's team comprising Christine Hobbs (player-manager), Mary Cannon, Andrea Campbell and Ann Joy. The team was scheduled to play North Shore, Auckland, Franklin and Rotorua. The only result that has been supplied was the contest v Franklin which was won by the visitors 12-0.

6th Asian and Commonwealth Championships

The national selectors, John Lelliott (convenor), Alan Tomlinson and Frank O'Gorman), named the following team to represent New Zealand at the 6th Asian championships to be held at Djkarta, Indonesia 21-31 January, 1982 and the 6th Commonwealth championships at Bombay, India 3-9 February, 1982.

Pinkewich and Tuckett won the men's doubles. Aucklanders, Kerry Palmer, Lindsay Jarvis, Peter Jackson, Bob Lassen and Barbara Jackson competed but without success.

Training Overseas


Prior to competing at the 36th World Championships at Novi Sad, Yugoslavia, Barry Griffiths, New Zealand's promising junior, was sponsored by the Auckland Association to travel to England for tournament play and training. Griffiths arrived in England on 5 February and joined Bob Tuckett of Australia and was accepted as a member of the Sealink Milton Keynes Club. Barry played in a number of tournaments and trained with a number of ranked English players.

The venture was not the success expected, because sufficient preparation and contacts had not been settled before leaving New Zealand. However, it did prepare him for his next training excursion which he is currently undertaking in Sweden.

The NZ Association successfully negotiated a development grant, from the NZ Sports Foundation, to follow-up an invitation Griffiths received, to join the champion Swedish Falkenberg Club for training and competitive play. The New Zealand Sports Foundation was formed in 1978 with the support and assistance of the private sector and the Government. It operates independently of Government, commerical and sports agencies and membership is open to everyone. The development grant is one of the criterias which the Foundation has established to meet the special needs of young athletes of outstanding ability.

The press release about the grant read -

"Table Tennis - \$4,900. 16 year old Barry Griffiths of Auckland, currently the NZ Men's No. 2 player receives the first grant to a table tennis player. The Foundation's grant will enable him to travel to Sweden where he will spend 12 months concentrating on nothing but competition table tennis. The Foundation will continue to assist Griffiths providing the NZ Table Tennis Association submits a long-term development programme for the athlete."

The long-term development programme has been submitted. Griffiths has sent back regular monthly reports, which have indicated progress in training, an understanding of the Swedish language and a degree of success in competition play which augers well for continual assistance from the NZ Sports Foundation.

Barry breaks his Swedish training to join the NZ team competing at the 6th Asian championships at Djakarta in January 1982 and the 6th Commonwealth championships at Bombay in February 1982. Following the championships he will return to Sweden to continue his training. Griffiths is expected to return to New Zealand in May, 1982.

NZ Table Tennis Development Trust

By resolution of the 1981 annual general meeting "The New Zealand Table Tennis Development Trust" was officially established on 1 May, 1981. The Trust Fund is to provide financial assistance for New Zealand players to develop their game to international standards by travelling overseas for competitive play and coaching. This assistance would mainly be for young players who had reached or were approaching top New Zealand standards and who had the potential for further improvement. The Trust Fund could also be used for New Zealand coaches to attend overseas coaching seminars to improve their coaching techniques.

Members of the Development Trust is open to any individual, local authority or business firm or table tennis association with an initial annual subscription of a minimum of \$10.

Mr J. Lelliott, who originally presented the idea, is one of four trustees to be appointed to adminster the fund. An annual report and statement of accounts will be presented to the annual general meeting of the NZ Association and will be available to all members of the Trust.

NATIONAL LOTTERY

The following report on the outcome of the 1981 national lottery is supplied by Dick Lynn, convenor of the organising committee.

Total sales in the 1981 national lottery were 62,776 tickets, about 5,000 tickets down on last year's values. It was a fine result for Bay of Plenty, Bush, Canterbury, East Waikato, Franklin, Hawkes Bay, Hutt Valley and Kapiti Associations who sold near their allocation, but disappointing for the NZ Association and other provincial associations.

At the 1981 annual general meeting, it was decided not to run the lottery on the basis of guarantees. A fixed percentage of sales was to come to the NZ Association. So the amount that did come, 35% of sales, was \$11,011.80 from which costs of \$6,651.80 were met, leaving a net profit of \$4,360, a very disappointing result. Sponsorship for the ticket printing of \$500 was received from BATA SHOES (NZ) Ltd,

- 1. Do we engage a professional organiser?
- 2. Do we increase the ticket selling price to \$1 and double the value of the prizes?

Money has to come from a successful lottery so that we can keep pace with rising costs, and to maintain current activities.

UMPIRING

21 umpire test papers were submitted for marking and this was followed-up with 8 examinations for the practical test. We are pleased to record the names of the successful candidates -

C.S. Burridge (Waitemata), G.T.E. Clarkson (Marlborough), R.D. Gross (Franklin), P.T. Escott (Wellington), D.I. Stacey (East Waikato), (Mrs) S. Stacey (East Waikato), Miss L.A. Smith (East Waikato) and R.M. Wilson (Kapiti).

Probationary Umpire (practical test still to be taken)

D.R. Jackson (Auckland), I Moody (Manawatu), (Mrs) J. Clark (East Waikato) and R.A. Voice (Wairarapa).

Four candidates failed the provincial umpire's test paper.

Regional Co-ordinator, Keith Fraser, reported that he has conducted umpire classes and scored a good result with three candidates fully qualified as provincial umpires, including 15 year old David Stacey.

Ron Garrett, the Southland co-ordinator, has also reported that he has conducted classes, but as yet, no papers have been submitted.

International Umpire

Mike McAvinue was the sole New Zealand candidate among the 600 plus world-wide aspirants who sat the paper in the 7th international umpires examination. The result of his efforts will be known in February, 1982.

New Zealand National Umpire

It is proposed to conform with the ITTF requirements that to sit the international umpires paper the candidate must first excel as a national umpire. It is therefore, intended to introduce next year the NZ national umpires examination. It would be expected that many of our experienced provincial umpires will take the examination to improve their status.

"Table Talk"

The first newsletter for table tennis umpires was published and distributed widely in September, 1981. The paper has been catalogued for the New Zealand National Bibliography for the information of both New Zealand and overseas subscribers. It is expected that the second newsletter will be issued in February. Associations, umpires and players are welcomed to discuss any aspects of umpiring through the newsletter.

Recruiting Poster

The design of a recruiting poster featuring the Nittaku ball hovering over a table tennis net, is currently being finalised and should be available for distribution to Associations and clubs in the New Year.



The Alan and Edna McCallum Umpiring Trophies

At the instigation of Frank O'Gorman, two trophies have been presented to the NZ Association to commemorate and place on record the outstanding contribution made to table tennis by the late Alan Bruce McCallum and his wife Edna McCallum. The trophies are to be awarded to a boy and a girl under 18 years of age, who while umpiring during the New Zealand junior inter-association team contest are considered to excel in the performance of umpiring matches.

The rules governing the award have yet to be settled, but at the 1981 NZ junior inter-association teams championships, Mr F.J. O'Gorman selected Greg Bellamy (Hutt Valley) and Tanya McAvinue (Manawatu) as the first winners of the award. Both recipients featured with considerable credit later when they umpired many matches in the men's and women's annual inter-island contests.

Ministry of Recreation and Sport

For national projects in 1981/82, application has been made to the Minister of Recreation and Sport as follows:-

- (a) administration grant of \$5,874
- (b) appointment of a contracted coach \$4,000 subsidy
- (c) internal coaching \$3,000 subsidy
- (d) cost of travel and accommodation, 1981 junior team to Australia subsidy \$2,108.

An application was also made, for approval in principle, for half economy air fares for vice-president K.C. Wilkinson to attend a meeting of the ITTF Council in Hangchow, China in May 1982.

From the International Sports Competition Fund, an application was made for a grant of \$4,458, by way of subsidy of travel and accommodation, to send a national team to the 6th Asian championships in Djakarta, Indonesia in January, 1982 and to the 6th Commonwealth Championships in Bombay, India, in February, 1982.

Noted: - It has been subsequently learnt that the Minister approved a subsidy of \$4,166.

Tamasu Company Limited (Japan)

An agreement between Tamasu Co. Ltd and the NZ Association has been signed for the supply to the NZ national team members at international table tennis championships, inland and overseas, of a complete range of BUTTERFLY clothing equipment, bags, rackets and rubber of choice. The contract remains in force from 1 January, 1982 till 31 December, 1983 with mutual agreement for one more year. This is a tremendous offer which the NZ Association would be foolish not to accept. The first issues are for the NZ national team competing at the Asian and Commonwealth championships and for the NZ national junior team competing at the Australian junior championships in May, 1982.

The Tamasu Company has also widely distributed the BUTTERFLY 1982 colourful calendar which is of interest to table tennis enthusiasts. "The Table Tennis Report" with its English supplement and interesting articles is also being received.

The NZ Association is extremely grateful to the President, Mr Hikosuke Tamasu and his BUTTERFLY Company for the continual interest shown in the development of table tennis in New Zealand.

John Vaugham & Company Limited

The National Junior Coaching Schools for boys and girls were sponsored by the manufacturers of the adopted table tennis ball and other NITTAKU table tennis equipment. A cash donation of \$1,500, together with a supply of balls for the national and island championships and coaching schools were received from the Wellington agents, John Vaughan & Company Limited,

The Company has also provided on loan to the NZ Association a Taiwan electric table tennis training machine. The principle of the training machine is similar to the Stiga Robot machine, but in no way equals the Stiga Robot capabilities. The machine is at present being evalued on its usefulness to promote table tennis.

The NZ Association appreciates the support being received from the Nippon Takkyu Company Limited of Japan through their New Zealand agents.

New Zealand Sports Foundation

We acknowledge with thanks the financial assistance given by the New Zealand Sports Foundation by way of a Development grant of \$4,900 to Barry Griffiths, covering a contribution of \$2,500 towards airfares to Stockholm, Sweden and return and a training allowance of \$200 per month for 12 months (\$2,400). The training allowance was also subsidised by the NZ Association by a further \$50 per month.

Barnett Sports, marketers of Yasku, Stiga and Barnett table tennis equipment. Through the courtesy of Simon Barnett, Managing Director of Barnett Sports, Stiga net measures are being distributed to qualified active umpires. The measure is a useful gadget and all umpires are better equipped by having a net height measure in their possession.

Barnett Sports have supplied copies of the Yasaka Graph magazine to the NZ Association and we are grateful to have the opportunity of reading the table tennis articles and to study the action photographs published in this magazine.

The New Zealand national team which competed at the Novi Sad World championships, were supplied with Yasaka bags, shoes and bat covers and again this came about through the personal interest of Simon Barnett.

Acknowledgement is also given to Parnett Sports for the printing and distribution of the NZ Table Tennis Development Trust registration forms.

PERMANENT TROPHIES

New Zealand Championships

With the permission of the Wellington Association, the Wellington Cup and Rose-bowl trophies for the open mixed doubles event of the NZ championships, which had no space for further engraving, were replaced by two new trophies presented by members of the Rau family. The new trophies were named the "Franklin Cup" and were presented by Mr and Mrs Rau to the winners of the 1981 open mixed doubles event, which, as a coincident was won by their son Geoff and Christine Lee.

South Island Championships

Following an inspection of the two cups for the South Island men's and women's singles championship event, which were first presented in 1940, it was considered that both cups were no longer in good condition and that they should be replaced.

The eight South Island Associations agreed to contribute to the cost of purchasing two new trophies together with the cost of engraving the title of the cups. The new challenge cups were presented at the 1981 South Island championships, and the previous trophies withdrawn for housing in the archives.

Trophies Destroyed by Fire

The fire at the Auckland stadium destroyed the Arnold Percy Memorial trophy for the men's singles, 35 years and over event, of the New Zealand championships, and the Arthur Meachen Memorial Cup, awarded to the Association whose players gained the most successes in the finals of the open and senior age group events. The replacement of the trophies will be met by the insurance coverage on the contents destroyed in the fire.

Fortunately, the Kean Challenge Shield and the Herber G. Teagle Memorial Challenge Sheild, for the winners of the men's and women's inter-association teams championship respectively, were not in the Auckland stadium at the time and this part of the NZ history has not been lost.

Additions

The Alan and Edna McCallum umpiring trophies are added to the list of permanent trophies. The cups, which are awarded to a boy and a girl who excel at umpiring matches during the junior inter-association teams championships, will be listed under the section "Individual awards".

Trophies required

For the NZ Junior Championships, the following events are not yet covered by permanent trophies:

Under 12 years age group:

Boys' team competition - shield required
Girls' teams competition - shield required
Boys' doubles event - 2 cups required
Mixed doubles event - 2 cups required

The North Island Championships would be complete with a trophy for the boys' singles, under 14 years. There are also a number of events for the South Island championships, particularly doubles events in the junior section, requiring trophies.

Specifications laid down for the donation of permanent trophies are:

EPNS or better, plinth to be plastic or wood, total height of trophy and plinth to be not less than 30cm, height of plinth not less than 8mm, value of trophy to be not less than \$60.

Honours Award

Congratulations are extended to RICHARD JOHN RASSIE for the award of the M.B.E. for service to sport, particularly table tennis, which was announced in the Queen's New Year Honours List.

Lower Hutt Civic Award

For services to recreation and youth activities, with particular mention to table tennis and to the Empire Club, Ronald J. Menchi received a civic honours award from the Lower Hutt City Council.

This year under review has been a difficult year. Though activities were carried out on the same scale as for the last two years, costs incurred in carrying out these activities have outstripped the financial returns that came in.

Four coaching schools and three coaching seminars held in conjunction with the final visit of the English coach, Peter Hirst, and the sending of a New Zealand Junior Team to Australia were the main events of the season, involving considerable expenditure from revenue funds. The coaching was made possible by way of a financial grant of \$7,000 received from the Government's Recreation and Sports Programme. The tour to Australia was made possible by contributions of \$4,000 received from the players and managers.

The sending of a New Zealand team to the World Championships in Yugoslavia was made possible by using funds available in the Overseas Tour Fund, contributions of \$6,000 received from the players and manager, and a generous air package deal arranged by the Australian Table Tennis Association for Melbourne to Belgrade and return.

The total of unavoidable administration costs for this year came to \$20,222 as against \$16,050 for 1980. A grant of \$5,240 received from Recreation and Sports reduces the year's total to \$14,982. The increase is 25% and together with other operating expenses of \$9,130 has meant for the first time that no funds are available for transfer to the Overseas Tour Fund.

Income this year decreased by \$4,940 as a result of:-

- No proceeds coming from the N.Z. Games held in Auckland in January, 1981, compared to the profitable Chinese tour of New Zealand the previous year.
- A poor result from the National Lottery, due to change in basis of selling raffle tickets working adversely against the New Zealand Association.
- 3. Affiliation fees being pegged at the same rates for 1980.

The net current working capital has decreased from \$28,396 in 1980 to \$18,083 in October 1981. A short term deposit of \$5,000 with our bankers was redeemed. \$6,000 deposit with Marac Finance Ltd was redeemed during the year, and a sum of \$5,000 invested instead with Marac Finance Ltd, hopefully in return for sponsorship of a players' fixtures list.

The future has one bright aspect on the horizon - fifty percent of overseas travel and accommodation costs are to be met by proceeds available from the raffle run by the Government for the benefit of national sporting associations.

It is expected that the total operating expenses for 1982 and 1983 will be \$30,000 and \$36,000 respectively. To meet these costs, and enable all normal activities to be maintained, it will be necessary to obtain \$17,000 and \$23,000 from affiliation fees in the next two years, and a minimum gauranteed income of \$10,000 from the National Lottery in future. The system of asking contributions from players participating in overseas tours will need to be maintained despite generous grants forthcoming from N.Z. Sports Lottery funds.

APPRECIATION

Our thanks are due to the New Zealand Press Association, Radio New Zealand, Television One, South Pacific Television, local newspapers and monthly magazines for the space and time provided to release table tennis news.

Our thanks are also due to the many table tennis scribes who write articles and supply information to the various news outlets. Without their personal efforts Table Tennis would not fare as well for publicity.

A tribute is also paid to Association Secretaries and committee members for the enthusiasm displayed in the control and management of the activities of their Association.
