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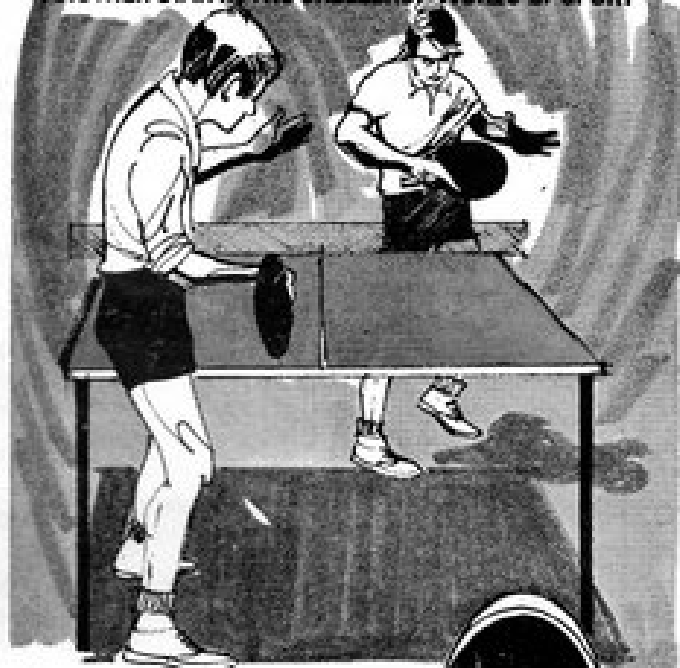
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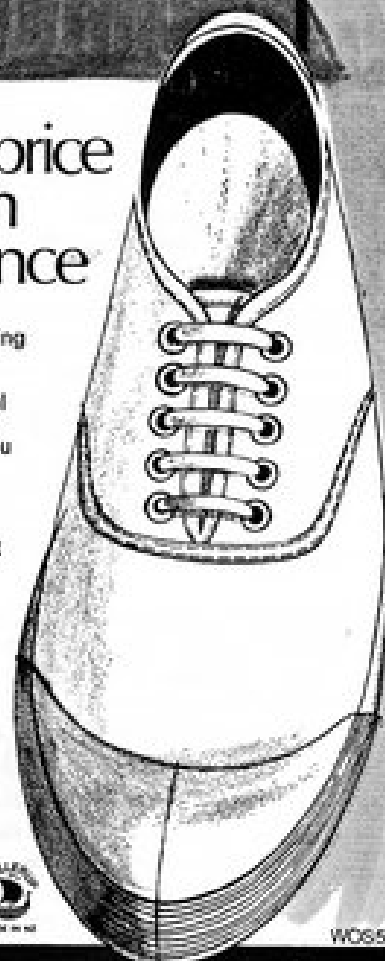


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Ling Nan Ming, 1972 Canterbury Open Men's Singles Champion.

JAMES MORRIS (Northland), who is ranked No. 1 in New Zealand, despite the fact he did not win the National title. James deserved his high ranking because of his fine win in the North Island Championships and consistent play in other tournaments in 1971.

GARY MURPHY (Hamilton). This former Hutt Valley and Otago player has been prominent over the past five years and has gained New Zealand representative honours. Gary was New Zealand Champion in 1970 and represented New Zealand in 1971.

ALAN TOMLINSON (Auckland). A loop driving player with a preference for building up on attack from a powerful forehand drive. Alan has represented New Zealand on numerous occasions and in 1959 and 1964 won the New Zealand Men's singles championship. Although this gifted player is not as fast as he used to be he will still gain more than his share of successes.

RICHARD LEE (Hamilton). A very dedicated player who has stormed to the top in men's table tennis in this country. Richard is a very hard-hitting forehand player who is determined to do well at the sport and to also successfully defend his National singles title won at Wanganui last year.

TERRY O'CARROLL (Hamilton). This former Northland player gained New Zealand representative honours in 1967 and since that time has been in the top section of New Zealand players. Terry had a very successful record as a junior player and twice won the New Zealand boys under 18 singles championship.

Pen Pictures of Prominent Players . . .

WONG LOKE SIM (Canterbury). A Malaysian student who spent some time in Auckland before transferring to Christchurch to continue his studies. Wong Loke Sim is a very quick, hard-hitting pengrip player who has the potential to beat most top players in the country.

LING NAN MING (Canterbury). This popular Malaysian student has been a fine ambassador for his country as apart from being a fine player, he is a true sportsman. Ling Nan Ming had won numerous matches against the best New Zealand had to offer but he could not win a major singles title. This year Ling Nan Ming was finally rewarded for his efforts when he won the Canterbury open men's singles title, and since then has narrowly lost the final of both the North Island and South Island men's singles championships each in five games.

GARRY FREW (Northland). This fine player who first represented New Zealand in 1954 is a very skillful all-round player who is equally at home either attacking or playing a defensive role. Garry is noted for his outstanding doubles play and has won numerous national championships with Neti Traill and Murray Dunn.

MURRAY BORLASE (Hutt Valley). A player who made a big impact as a junior and won numerous championships. Since graduating to open play Murray has achieved many notable successes as apart from gaining New Zealand representative honours this fine player has also represented North Island, Wellington, and Hutt Valley. A strong all-round loop driving player Borlase should be prominent in this tournament.

BARRY CROSS (Canterbury). The former Wellington and Hutt Valley player has been in great form in his first season in Christchurch and has been one of the most impressive players in the senior grade. Barry has a very sound all-round game and could be one of the dark horses in this tournament. He is the present South Island men's singles title-holder.

JOHN ARMSTRONG (Canterbury). John first represented Canterbury over twenty years ago and is still a top flight player. Although predominately a defensive player John has revealed himself to be a skillful attacker at

times. John can still test the tops in the country as was proved in the senior national coaching school round robin tournament in May when he was a surprise winner.

NEVILLE BRIGHTWELL (Canterbury). Neville won't retire and why should he as he is still one of the finest attacking players in the country. Neville has played in 275 first class matches in New Zealand and his record is sure to be extended in the years to come. Veteran players watch out — Neville is in your grade now.

MAURICE BURROWES (Canterbury), a very talented hard-hitting forehand player who refuses to accept other than the role of the dictator of play. Maurice has been a consistent winner of championships this season and has taken the Otago, Marlborough and Canterbury A grade men's singles titles.

WAYNE ADAMSON (Canterbury). A young player who three years ago was unknown but today is one of the most promising players in New Zealand. Wayne has a very good spin serve and a vicious loop drive, and recently won the Nelson open men's singles championship.

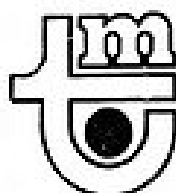
NETI TRAILL (Northland), is unquestionably New Zealand's finest woman player ever. Her record eight wins in the New Zealand women's singles championship and her brilliant play at the Commonwealth championships at Singapore last year enabled New Zealand to gain the silver medal. Neti was ranked 5th in the Commonwealth.

YVONNE FOGARTY (Otago), like her father, Bill Fogarty (who, incidentally, will be playing in these championships) has been an outstanding player for her province and again like her father has represented New Zealand. Yvonne will be trying hard to win this tournament — she last won at Auckland in 1969.

ANN STONESTREET (Auckland). A surprise winner of the national women's singles title last year at Wanganui is a forcing player who gains many points with a well-angled forehand kill shot. Ann will no doubt be endeavouring to win her second title this year.

MRS JOY FLINT and MRS TUI ADAMSON are able members of the Social Committee, while RON ANDERSON, PETER GASCOYNE, and IVAN HATHERLEY are serving a second term as Executive members. HARRY TAYLOR, JOE CZERNOHORSKY, DOUG ADAMSON, and MISS JENNIFER STAGG are first year members.

South Africa Report from Bryan Foster

Table Tennis in South Africa seems to be struggling against insurmountable difficulties with the "whites" and "non-whites" being two separate bodies. The Africans and Indians belong to the official and recognised unracial body and the Europeans to the racial and Government supported body. The Government only supports racial sport but the I.T.T.F. recognises only the coloured non-racial group. This means there is no play between whites and coloureds and this considerably reduces their competition. The contrary policies of the I.T.T.F. and the South African Government have created a stalemate which has prevented all international competition since 1957. This has largely contributed to the fact that their game has advanced technically so slowly and the type of game that is being played now was being played in New Zealand in the early 1960's.

The conditions of play do not seem as good as we would expect in New Zealand with the lights not being very good and most rooms seem cramped for space. The standard of womens play seems very poor and from what I have seen I doubt that any would rate in our top ten. For any visitor such as myself the situation becomes rather delicate if one wishes to play in any official tournament. If I play in a tournament organised by the coloured section, I would be acting contrary to the Government's policy and could have to leave the country. If on the other hand, I play in a tournament organised by the European section, the I.T.T.F. would probably suspend me, as they have already suspended Mike Simmons for doing just that. Mike is an ex-England international. Consequently, I have played against both groups but only in practice games. In my view Mike Simmons would be as good as anyone in New Zealand but there is quite a drop in standard after him. The standard of play in Rhodesia is weak also, but not because of apartheid problems. It does not belong to the I.T.T.F. and has not had any international competition for many years — it competes with South Africa's whites only. It seems a great shame to me that the South African Government will not allow international teams to compete there are large numbers of extremely dedicated players who eventually give up through lack of incentives.

The first National Junior Coaching Schools were conducted in 1959, the boys' school held at Palmerston North and the girls' school at Hamilton. This year the 14th Boys' and Girls' National Coaching Schools were conducted by the Canterbury Association under the Directorship of the National Director of Coaching, Mr T. R. D. Flint.

Most of our top players today have attended some of these schools and received valuable help, guidance, and encouragement. A large number of most promising players have dropped out of Table Tennis after graduating through our National Coaching Schools. As this is of considerable interest and concern to administrators and players I have set out the full details of all National Junior Coaching Schools held to date.

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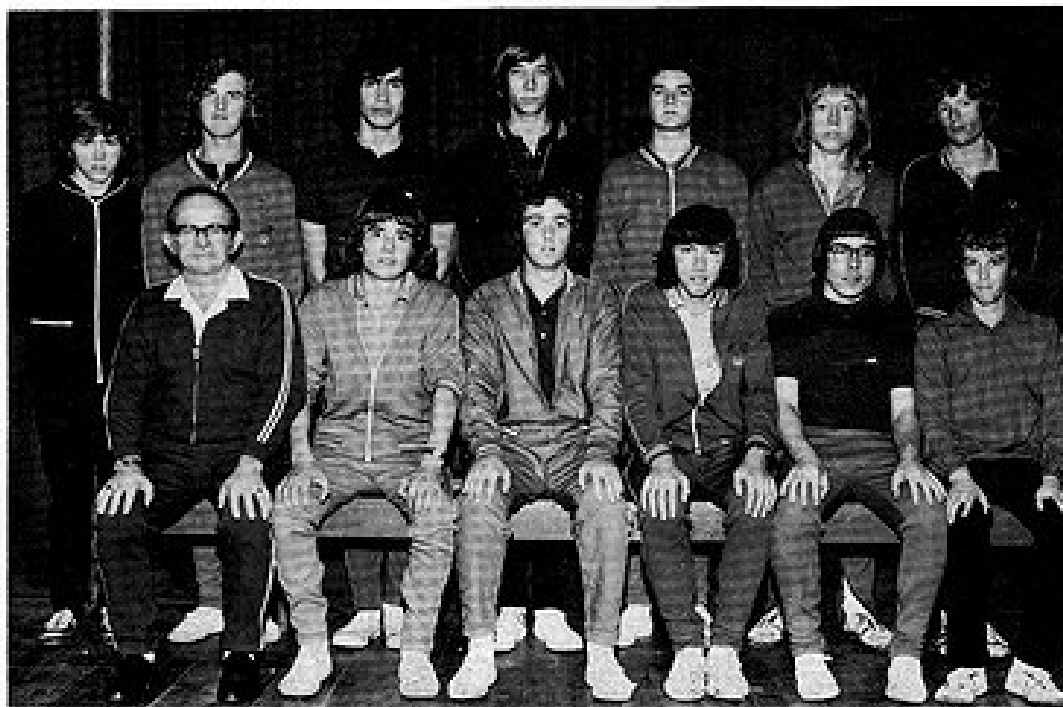

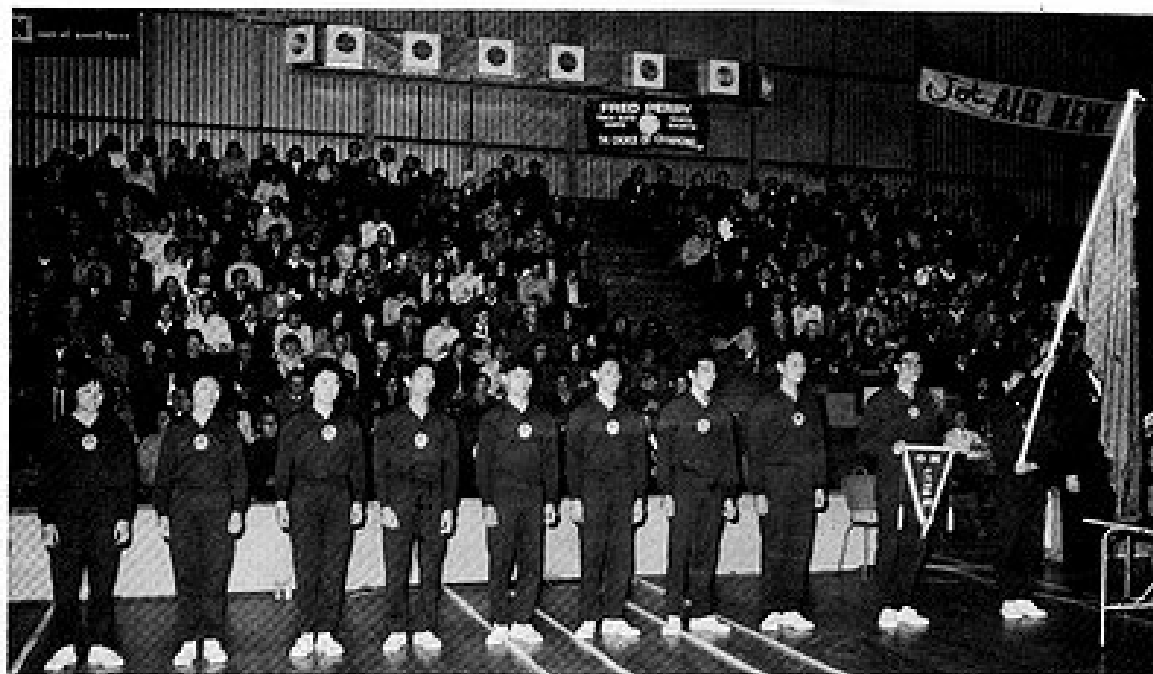

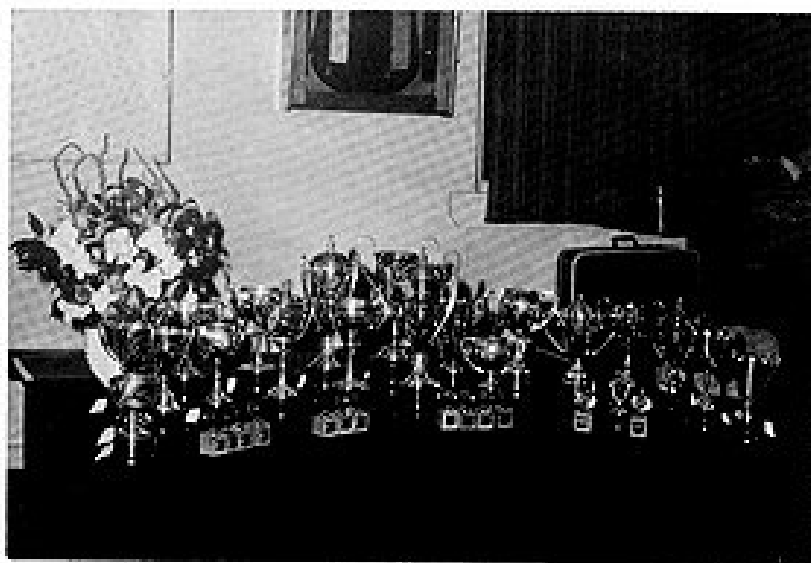

Victor the Nonpareil

IN MEMORIAM by Hon. Ivor Montagu

Victor Barna was the greatest table tennis player who ever lived, the most graceful in form and movement, the most complete in technical equipment, the most intelligent in strategy, the most masterly in combat, the most thoughtful in his approach to the game, the most able and single-minded in his devotion to its problems and their solutions after the best of his playing days were over.

Add to this his qualities as a person: a happy husband, a man of wry humour who mellowed as he grew older, a good friend. Truly an era has passed with his death at the other end of the world.

In sport it is always difficult to convey to a succeeding generation the qualities of the champions it has never seen. Who was the finest batsman: W. G. Grace, Hobbs or Bradman? Were the Doherty's "better" than Perry, or than Laver and Rosewall today? Was Bob Fitzsimmons "greater" than Dempsey or is Mohammed Ali indeed "the greatest" of all? How compare the incomparable, and who has seen all of them with his own eyes? The conditions have changed. All I can do for the reader who knew not Victor as a player is to picture his style just a little and recall his peerless record.

His attack was so good that no one

but those of his opponents who fought to take the initiative away from him appreciated that his floating, subtle defence was even better. His backhand was so spectacular that few spectators appreciated that the winning rally position had often been opened by his forehand. His positioning was so perfect that, with the slightest change of foot angle and body balance, his flick could instantly and invisibly alter the direction of the ball from diagonal to straight or vice versa, leaving the opponent floundering out of reach for it or else hopelessly and impotently passed.

Often one sees really great players who impose their will with a limited repertoire by qualities of character and persistence, or who throw away caution and take chances, conquering the heights by courage. But Barna at his best had everything. He could adjust to any opposition, and his matches were so memorable because whereas many victors win by exploiting the weak points of their opponents, Victor's treasurers were so inexhaustible that often he seemed to delight in coping with and overcoming his opponents' strengths.

DOMINATED

We first saw the future nonpareil at the World Championships in Budapest

in the spring of 1929 when he was not yet 18 years old. The situation should be imagined. In those days — the earliest of World table tennis — Hungarians dominated as effectively as the Far East has done in the last couple of decades.

In the first year, the older generation prevailed, veterans from the years before the first world war won all the titles. But back home, their new-won laurels fresh upon them, the seniors were immediately out-distanced by fresh youngsters, who next season outshone their elders in the brilliance of their play.

Then in 1929, the third season, yet younger teenagers swept these latter aside to reign from that time onward, Barna and his more staid and run-of-the-mill partner Miklos Szabados in their van. Between them, in seven successive seasons, these two now won six World Singles Championships, shared six Men's Doubles (Barna won the seventh also but with another partner one year that Szabados was suspended), and also took five Mixed.

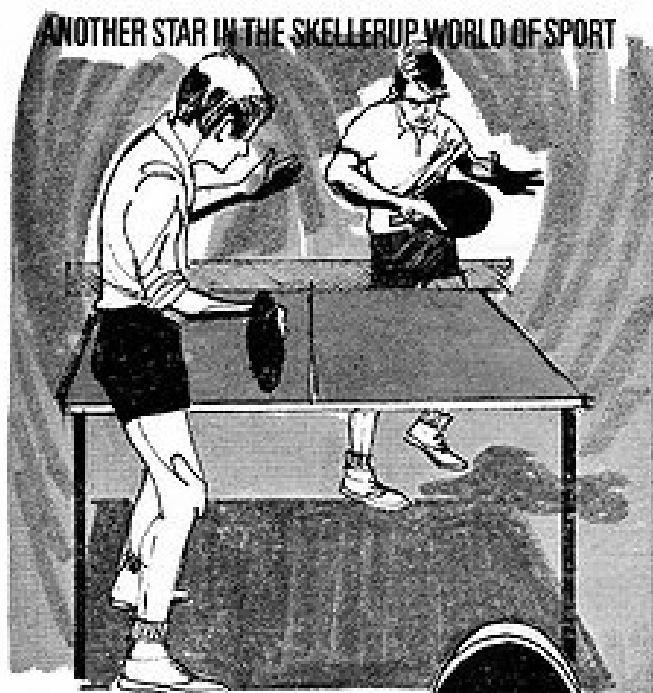
Barna's personal tally, as everyone knows, can never be rivalled: in the World's — five Singles (four in succession and one runner-up), eight Men's Doubles (with three different partners), three Mixed, seven times member of a winning Swaythling Cup team; the National Opens one can hardly begin to count — in the English I list five Singles, seven Men's Doubles (with five different partners), eight Mixed (with four) and I am not sure I have them all. This, by the way, is the record of a man who broke his right arm as early in his career as the decade after he began. (After this happened in a motor-car accident Barna began a certain, not easily perceptible decline. He appeared as brilliant as ever, but there was lacking just a fraction of that supreme inner confidence and resourcefulness at the crux).

SOCIAL SITUATION

To follow Barna's life story one should also understand the social situation in the Hungary of those days. The Hungary of before the first world war, prolonged in the 20's and 30's by a successful counter-revolution, was a feudal country, ruled over by great landowners and the rich. There could be, and was, no mass popular participation in sport.

Sport was confined in the main to a few aristocratic clubs in the centre, and gifted youth outside these circles

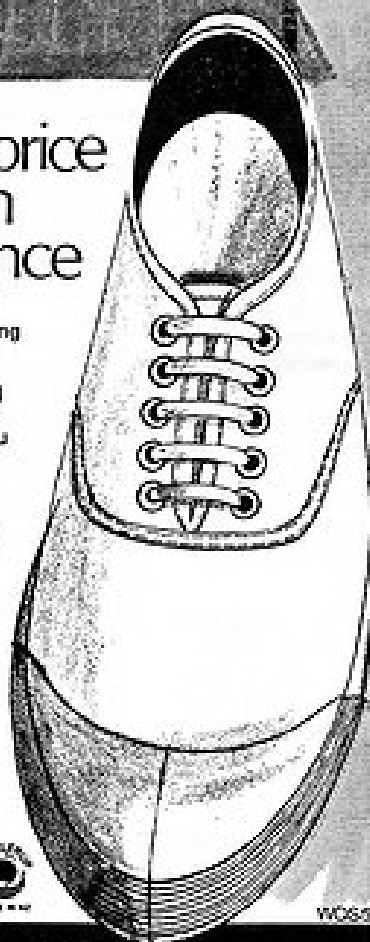


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found its only sporting opportunity in the chance of being picked up and taken under the wing of one or other of such clubs to gain advantage over its rivals.

With its feudal basis, Hungarian society of those days was also rigidly anti-Semitic, and it was a strange thing to those who knew the circumstances in Central Europe to realise that so many of the young Hungarian table tennis geniuses of the period were Jewish in origin.

But the keen and influential sportsmen of the favoured clubs knew how to have their cake and eat it. They wanted the most promising talent in their sides and they knew how to square the racial chauvinists who banned national teams from including Jewish players.

They included the recruits but hid them under good Hungarian names. Thus Muller was made to play as "Magyar", Klein — an only slightly less brilliant contemporary of Victor — won an English Open as 'Kelen', and Victor himself, born Braun, became known to the world as 'Barna'. (His first name, Victor, was just a straight translation of his given name Oyozo, necessary because no Englishman can pronounce that Hungarian o surmounted by two dots).

Long before the 'Cold War' we have become used to in this epoch turned every migrant from Eastern Europe into a 'victim' or 'deserter' according to the point of view, the enterprising youth of the smaller Central European countries sought wider fields abroad, free of such constriction in their homelands, in the more extensive opportunities provided by the wider countries. The talented Hungarian table tennis youngsters were no exception.

Thus of their crop Glancz and Ballak found themselves in America, Szabados in Australia, Barna first, for a time, in France and then in Britain, where, eventually, he took up British nationality. Here he and his wife Suzy were to live amongst us and benefit us for more than thirty years. In this role Victor became a shining light in English table tennis, an always loyal and willing helper and counsellor to the Association, as well as an extraordinarily successful ambassador and propagandist for the game everywhere abroad. It was a second, quite different but no less illustrious career.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

It could not have been an easy matter for Victor Barna to make the change. First, the best player in the world, who raised table tennis not only to a sport but even above — to an art — merely by his grace and skill. Second, through the disappointments of a declining success (after his car crash and with the approach, later, of middle age), to now respect and service as a technician and business expert.

I know he would smile now in acknowledgement if I were to say: hard as it is for the drab caterpillar to change into a gorgeous butterfly, the reverse and more pedestrian alteration must be a yet more painful miracle.

At first he captained for England, with a splendid conscientiousness, both men's and women's teams. He encouraged youngsters, by training and partnering them in doubles. He threw himself into the County game and carried Middlesex to the honours. He pioneered exhibition play before new audiences in the halls.

An artist such as he lived on his nerves, and as the effort to maintain his level grew more strenuous, the strain grew greater. I remember the first time he fell in an early round of the World's; this was bitter to him and, rightly or wrongly, he complained of the softness of the table service, something I had never heard him do before. Then he smiled ruefully at himself and said: 'When I was young I should never have noticed if I was playing on a velvet carpet'.

What made possible his second great contribution to table tennis was his meeting with Dunlop's. Dunlop's is a big firm, highly diversified, and table tennis, indeed any one sport by itself, is but a small matter in the grand totality of their affairs.

I do not know how it was exactly: whether the firm recognised his ability and opened the way to him, or whether he recognised their potentiality and opened the way for them. Anyway, they grew very much together.

Dunlop's is not the only firm in the world that makes good equipment, but nonetheless the fact that so big a firm, with such world-wide connections, made and sold everywhere equipment of such quality was not only a source of profit and maybe, in a small way, prestige

to the firm, it was a source of untold advantage to the spread of the game, the establishment and raising of standards in all parts of the globe.

APPRECIATED

This success, Dunlop's, as well as the playing community, owed largely to the lucky partnership between themselves and Barna, to his shrewdness, his experience, his unrivalled global acquaintance. I am sure they appreciated this. But it became odd to realise that, at the last, for the handful remaining who still knew the great Barna as the incomparable player, there were literally millions younger to whom all this was a bygone legend and who knew only Barna the businessman.

As a Briton, Barna became perhaps even more world-famous in this capacity than he had been as a Hungarian, in the days of his beginnings. But he never forgot or forsook his roots. He remained an honoured guest in his birthland and often visited there the two sisters who survived the war.

I have said that the later Victor relaxed, grew more philosophical. Shy and even edgy in the youthful days of high competition, he grew unnecessarily modest, increasingly placid, wise, humorous.

Highly opinionated and therefore stubborn, he and I both, we would in middle days often find ourselves arguing vigorously and even quarrelling loudly, before we quieted down enough to find that we were both agreed. Increasingly, in the later years, we would find that we did agree nearly always, with each other, if with no one else.

We became ancient relics together. In the end there was no one at all, whose opinions on technique or strategy and everything relating to this side of things I more respected.

It is not sad to go quickly. What is sad is for those who are left. All others of long married partnership must feel tender now towards Suzy, for they can understand. But today there is a big hole in table tennis for all of us. We are all, in a sense, bereft. The friend who shed lustre on what we loved is gone. There is only the legend.
