

Hi there oldies,

The Northern Districts Region is being revived and meetings among some of the associations representatives have put together plans for a veterans teams tournament.

NDJTT has continued with its junior teams tournaments in the past but NDTTR has found problems in getting the right mix for a veterans event.

The aim was not only to fill in a few gaps in the veterans programmes but also try to encourage the hundreds of social playing vets, without having them face hardened tournament players.

There often has been expressed a wish among non-tournament veterans and social players that they would like an occasional game against players from other associations, but against players of their own strength.

North Harbour had a most successful tournament two years ago, held mid-week, but last year it was changed to a weekend and the social players were "frightened off" by the tournament players becoming available because of the day selected.

One idea was for associations to enter a team(s) and the host association would then select the teams in grades. The only age barrier would be that all players would be over-40.

One of the problems would be that curse of the veterans playing well outside their age group. For example, it could mean that a team of 39-year-olds, could play a team of 75-year-olds.

I can't understand the set minds of administrators who give twoyear gaps for the juniors from 11 to 21, then after 35 the gaps increase. In other words the older you get the harder it becomes. Associations exist because of the veterans, as players and as administrators. Take away the oldies and there would be little left. Yet, apart from the national veterans there is little tournament life for them after 60. Most of the associations have 40, 50 and 60 divisions, the same as the North and South Islands and Summer. As can be seen in the following results the veterans numbers, after 50, are falling sharply in all associations. The most popular tournaments are in the growing Masters series, and that is because there have a greater age range..........but, alas, these tournaments are not recognised by TTNZ.

Perhaps the answer would be to tighten up the rules and regulations for the Masters so they come up to TTNZ tournament standard......but then the relaxing atmosphere of the Masters would be lost.

Associations may consider having one-day veterans tournamentsjust veterans, or even have social player only sections. Most of these players are registered with associations, or would be soon.

Re-thinking IMR

There has to be a bit of thinking outside the square so perhaps a good place to start would be a two-tiered system for IMR. We have to find some way to increase our registered numbers yet eliminate the ridiculous situation of registering an 85-year-old rest homer because she wants to play social table tennis every month.

We are already forcing quite a number of social players to private unregistered little clubs but there are some in New Zealand who believe that all should be registered, without exception.

We must also evolve a system whereby associations who do not have competitive players on a scale of others do not pay extraordinarily high fees, while other associations who have the numbers and the money hold the national body to ransom over IMR payments.

David Jackson became the first New Zealander to pass the International Referees examination.

There was a glowing report from his examiner who stated that it was rare for anyone to pass the exam at the first sitting.

This is another chapter in the remarkable achievements of the Jackson family. Bob is a Hall of Famer; Barbara, a winner of national vets titles and still playing interclub at Waitemata; as does David, who has been a multiple vets gold medallist; Peter, nearing the end of an Olympic and Commonwealth career; and Phillip a talented junior but who doesn't pick up a bat nowadays.

Island ping pong

For any veteran who wants to combine some leisure time in the beautiful Cook Islands with an occasional game of table tennis.....the sport has been revived in these exotic islands. Games are played in the Avatiu Recreational Centre in Rarotonga where there are 30 members and on nearby island Mangaia where there are more than 60 members.
