It is fitting that in spite of difficulties, the Association will give the players and the public of Christchurch the opportunity of seeing the reigning world's champions.

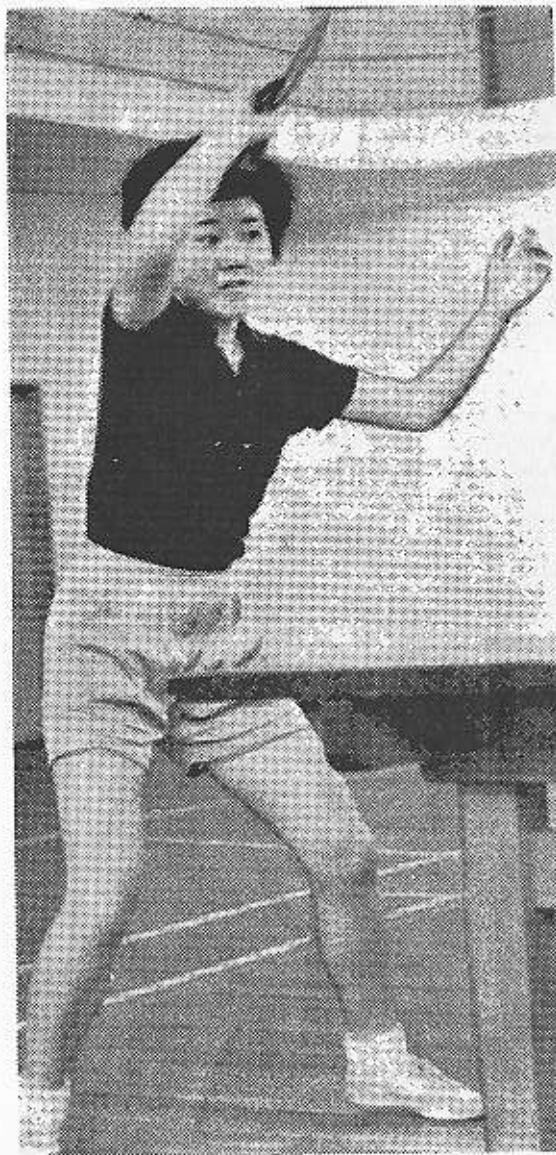
I hope that all will enjoy seeing these players and that the visit will help to further improve the high standard of the game in Canterbury.

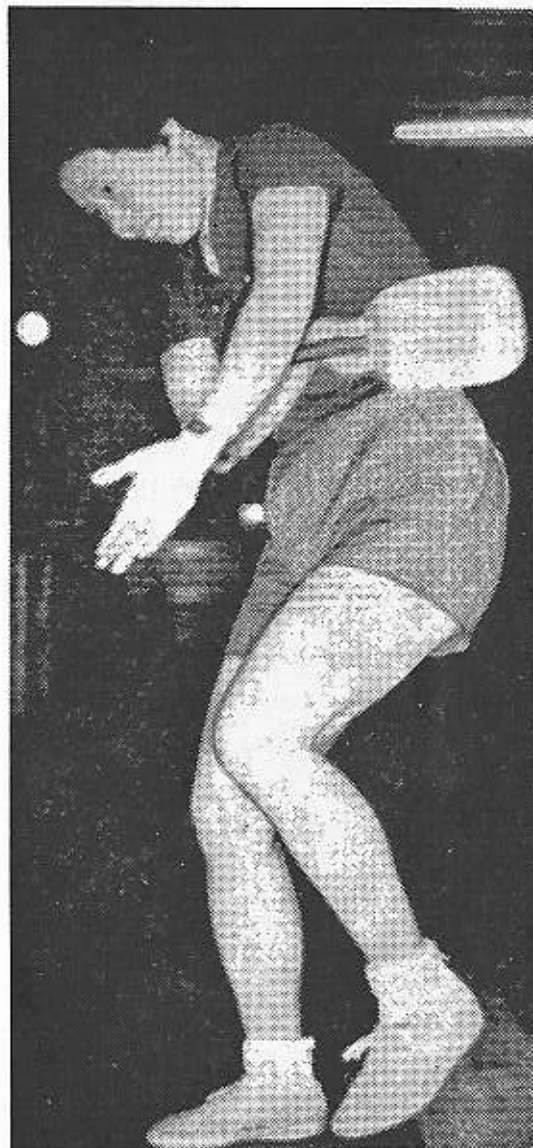
It is not often that reigning world champions in any sport are seen in New Zealand, but this will be the second time in four seasons that table tennis title-holders have visited the Dominion.

The tour, which starts on June 4, by Misses K. Matsuzaki and K. Yamaizumi, world singles and doubles champions respectively, follows the extremely successful tour of the Dominion in 1957 by T. Tanaka and I. Ogimura. Tanaka and Ogimura, each of whom had held the world singles title twice in the previous four years, made a fine impression in all their matches with spectacular exhibitions of fast and enterprising play.

The Japanese women will prove a special attraction for several reasons. They will be using the controversial sponge-rubber bats which were first introduced into world competition seven years ago by Asian players, and which have been widely adopted in all countries since then. Also they both employ the pen-grip style of holding the bat, a style much favoured by all Asian players.

Dominated

For six seasons now the Japanese players have dominated world competition in table tennis, and players from China, Vietnam and Korea are only very slightly behind them in skill. In the middle 1950's this domination was attributed to their new sponge-rubber bats, or their unusual grip of the bat, both of which were strange to the European champions. Since then the leading players in other countries have had much practice against both these, and have adopted the sponge-rubber themselves, yet they are still being beaten.

The answer to this, as is now being realised, is that the Asian players are simply the best table tennis players in the world, and would be so no matter what type of bat they used, or how they held it.

The success of the Japanese players is based upon superb footwork, allied to great powers of concentration and recovery. Also, the Japanese when they are losing a match attack all the harder, scorning the practice of playing for safety when in a bad position. They hold the theory that the player who is taking the attack in any rally has an 80 per cent chance of winning the point, and so make it their business to attack at every opportunity, especially when losing.

These factors combine to make the Japanese players most attractive to watch, and the touring women will be no exception. Their play in the 1959 world championships in Dortmund, and later in the English championships, endeared them to all supporters of the game.

Miss Matsuzaki, a 21-year-old university student, is at present ranked first in the world following her success at Dortmund. She went through the women's singles for the loss of only one game, this when she was taken to four games by the defending champion, Miss F. Eguchi, of Japan, in the final.

Miss Kazuko Yamaizumi

Aged 25, Miss Yamaizumi won the Japanese singles title in 1957 and the world doubles title last season. She also won all three titles at the Tokyo championships last year against a world-class field. She is also a world-ranked player. She won the world women's doubles with Miss T. Nanba, beating Misses Matsuzaki and Eguchi in the final.

Mr Hitoshi Shimizu

The Manager of the Japanese team, Mr Shimizu, is a Director of the Japan Table Tennis Association. The third University graduate of the touring party, Mr Shimizu was educated at the Chuo University, Tokyo, where he is at present a lecturer. Mr Shimizu has also shown his ability as a player during the tour in exhibition singles matches against local officials.

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Order of Play for Singles

In the programme proper of this publication, the names of the singles players have been omitted from the order of play. This has been done because the draw for order of play will be made on the night of the match immediately before the first singles is to be played. The rules governing this draw is based on the Marcel Corbillon Cup Competition Regulations.

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Miss Joy Williamson

A former Canterbury and New Zealand table tennis champion, Miss Joy Williamson (whose picture adorns the cover of this programme) returned to New Zealand towards the end of 1959. The previous three years she had spent in England where she made a name for herself in the coaching field as well as extending her reputation as a player.

Miss Williamson played in two world championships, at Stockholm in 1957 and at Dortmund in 1959. In the former event she was eliminated in the first round by a top Korean player, Wei San-Sook, and last year at Dortmund she lost to a German player, also in a very close match.

Although Miss Williamson competed with success in the round of county and national tournaments in England and on the Continent each year, she considers that her best play was in the team events at last year's world championships. Miss Williamson and another Christchurch player, Miss Fay Inglis, formed a New Zealand team which did well in the international Corbillon Cup competition.

In the Corbillon Cup New Zealand did especially well against Japan and Hungary, which finished first and fourth in the competition. In the match against Japan, Miss Williamson gave the highly-ranked Miss Taeko Namba a hard struggle. After losing the first game, she led to 18-16 in the second, when a series of unlucky breaks lost her the game. Miss Namba is the present world doubles titleholder.

In her matches in England, Miss Williamson won the Scottish mixed doubles title, and the Irish singles and mixed doubles titles. She played first division inter-club matches for the Putney (Surrey) club, and has beaten all the English women players with the exception of Miss Ann Haydon. Miss Haydon was ranked second in the world in 1957, and the English women's team took fourth place equal with Hungary for the Corbillon Cup at the last world championships.

During the summer months, Miss Williamson spent her time coaching. Each summer she secured a position at one of the Butlin chain of holiday camps, at Clacton (1957), Filey (1958), and Pwllheli (1959). From May to September in these, and the other two Butlin camps at Ayr and Skegness, world-famous coaches under the direction of the former world champion, Johnny Leach, choose their most promising players, and at the end of the summer these attend a final week of coaching.

During the final week, the most promising boy and girl of the whole series are selected. It is to Miss Williamson's credit that, in each of her three years, one of her pupils won this honour.

Miss Williamson first won the Canterbury under-16 title in 1948 at the age of 13, and she was only 14 when she won her first Canterbury women's singles title in the following year. That year she also won the Canterbury and New Zealand under-16 and under-18 titles. She won the Canterbury women's singles title each year to 1956, with the exception of 1950. In 1951 and 1954 she won the national women's singles title, her first victory being at the age of 16.

"Although she has at times been beaten by New Zealand women, there has never been any doubt that she is the best the Dominion has seen," says the "Press."



Mrs June Magorian

Mrs June Magorian of Dunedin has been one of New Zealand's most consistently good players for a number of years. She did not play competitive table tennis last season, but for every season between 1948 and 1958 she was ranked in the top five in the Dominion—a fine record. This year June made a fine come-back to be the only player to beat Joy Williamson in the national trials at Petone.

June has held five New Zealand titles, but her only success in the national singles event was in 1955. This title has only very narrowly eluded her on several other occasions. With her sister, Miss Dorothy Leathley (now Mrs Chapman) June won the national women's doubles title in 1948, and she repeated this success in 1955 and 1958 with Patricia Purdon. With Neville Brightwell she won the New Zealand mixed doubles in 1953.

Like Joy Williamson, June Magorian represented New Zealand against the Rowe twins on their tour in 1953. June played in the first test in Dunedin, where she lost 6-21, 10-21 to Diane Rowe and 9-21, 14-21 to Rosalind Rowe. In 1957 with Margaret Hoar and Barbara Packwood she toured Australia, and reached the semi-finals of the Australian women's singles championship.

June's New Zealand rankings since 1948 have been: 1948, third; 1949, second; 1950, second; 1951, third; 1952, third; 1953, fifth; 1954, second; 1955, first; 1956, third; 1957, fifth; 1958, second.

EXHIBITION MATCH PLAYERS

JOHN ARMSTRONG

John Armstrong, who is the 5th ranked player in New Zealand, has been the most outstanding defensive player in New Zealand over the last four years and has played against overseas teams.

John, who has fine footwork, manages to retrieve seemingly impossible shots from all angles, and apart from his terrific defensive play can also attack when the occasion demands it.

John has represented both Canterbury and South Island on numerous occasions and has competed with much success.

He has been successful in winning Canterbury (twice), South Canterbury, Wellington, and South Island (twice) singles titles. A few doubles titles have also fallen his way.

John is still playing with the ordinary Barna bat and still manages to contain the sponge bat exponents.

NEVILLE BRIGHTWELL

Neville Brightwell is one of the most spectacular and aggressive players in New Zealand, and his back-hand drive is reputed to rank with that of M. Dunn's, of Wellington. Neville has been playing top flight table tennis for over twelve years and has given good service to both Canterbury, Otago and New Zealand.

He has played for New Zealand in 1949, 1950, and 1952. In 1950 in Europe he defeated the 4th ranked English international B. Crouch.

He has been successful in winning many championships including three Canterbury men's singles titles in succession, five Canterbury men's doubles titles and many mixed doubles titles at Provincial level. Neville has also won the Hutt Valley singles title and was five times South Island singles titleholder.

He won the National men's doubles title with J. S. Crossley in 1950 and 1951, and mixed doubles with Mrs Magorian in 1953. This year Neville has changed from a pimple-faced Barna bat to a specially made sponge bat, and is obtaining much more sting in his driving.

Japanese Itinerary

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1960 Tour by Australain Team

Canterbury table tennis supporters will have another opportunity in 12 days' time to see an overseas team competing against New Zealand's own players when Australia will play Canterbury at Christchurch on Monday, 4th July.

The Australian team is Geoff. Jennings and M. Wilcox, both of New South Wales. This is a particularly good team and apart from McDonald the Australian champion who was not available, is a strong Australian team by ranking positions. Jennings is ranked No. 3 and Wilcox No. 5. Jennings won the Easter Tournament in Melbourne this year against a very strong field which included ten of Australia's best twelve players. He has toured overseas extensively and has held the Australian title in recent years.

Wilcox is a junior who has an excellent record against all leading Australian players. He is a protege of Michael Szabados and held the New South Wales State Junior title. He was a member of the Australian team to play in the World Championships at Dortmund in 1959 and is a very attractive and aggressive player.

Both the New Zealand and Australian Associations are making concerted efforts to commence the biennial inter-change of visits. It falls to New Zealand's lot to be the hosts this year and we all hope that the tour will be the beginning of a regular inter-change of visits.
